DOG FOULING IN NASEBY

Daventry District Environmental Department has asked certain areas within the Daventry District to take part in an initiative to raise awareness of the dog fouling problem with a view to persuading the minority of dog owners, who do not clean up after their dogs, to take responsibility seriously and comply with the law. Naseby Parish Council agreed to take part in this initiative which encompasses the following:-

Any incident of dog fouling discovered within a designated area, the excrement will be sprayed with red marker paint. The result of this, it is hoped will be twofold, (a) it will highlight the fouled area, and be avoided by pedestrians. (b) Encourage the offending dog owner to clean it up.

The designated area or (the dog fouling hotspots) will be monitored frequently by the Parish Council and its findings will be submitted to the Daventry District Council's Environmental Improvement Officer.

It is hoped, that this initiative will appeal to offending dog owners better nature, to take their responsibility of dog ownership more seriously and also give an evidence base for any further action that may be required.

A huge thank you goes out to our volunteers who have helped with this.


FOUR GO TO AFRICA!

There are four young Naseby villagers looking forward to the thrilling and challenging trip of a lifetime this summer. Kate Hoyle, Ed Clement, Jack Dudleston and Millie Allen, aged 15-17 years, all attend Guilsborough School and will be travelling in late July, as part of a 45-strong group of students from the school, to Namibia in the south west of Africa, for an expedition lasting 28 days. During the time they are there, the four will be undertaking numerous activities all over the country, from community projects and trekking, to sand-boarding and wildlife viewing.

The main school party has been divided into three smaller teams, each of which has devised its own tour itinerary. For several days, some of the students will be working in an orphanage, interacting with the young children, whilst others will be working in a school, teaching or getting involved in building parts of the school. As Kate told me, "This is an amazing chance for us to help children much less fortunate than ourselves." As well as these community projects, the three teams will also be undertaking challenging treks lasting 3-5 days, climbing mountains, hiking through canyons and crossing deserts. The itinerary shown here illustrates the varied and exciting range of activities ahead of our intrepid foursome.

Ed explained: "The expedition is a life changing opportunity as it will develop us mentally and physically and give us an insight into how fortunate we actually are. Throughout the trip we will have to organise things ourselves, such as arranging our own transport, cooking our own meals and setting up our own tents and camping sites."

In the run up to the expedition, the students plan to hold a number of fund-raising events, which they hope will assist their personal efforts to raise the money needed to enable them to go on this incredible trip. Ed, Kate, Millie and Jack all hope you will come along to support and enjoy their events, which will include an "Empire Night", with the ever-popular local band, at the Village Hall on Sat 10 May. The youngsters are also planning some community work nearer home, such as car washing, dog walking and lawn mowing/watering (when the summer eventually arrives!), so have a think about the jobs you might need doing when they come knocking at your door!


We have also had an enquiry from Sky TV who may attend to film on both days and the evening for a new series that is being produced on Battlefields of Britain.

Firstly, I would like to wish everyone a warm welcome to 2014. With Christmas and New Year festivities out of the way, I already have a few things pencilled into my dairy for the coming year

I am pleased to report that, in the period April to December 2013, (compared with the same period 2012) there has been an overall reduction in crime across the Daventry Rural Sector (down 17%). The Force has been concentrating on Serious Acquisitive Crime, dwelling burglaries (down 17%), and theft of and from motor vehicles (down 32%).

We did have an attempted burglary in Clipston where the thieves were disturbed by the properties alarm. If you have an alarm, always set it when you go out. A large number of offences occurred where there are no visible signs of a forced entry. This usually indicates that the property or vehicles have been left insecure. Please remember to keep front and back doors locked at all times, even if you are in your homes. When out in your car, look out for Park Mark car parks and make sure you remove all items from your vehicle when you leave it, including the Sat Nav cradles and suction pads.

We also recommend getting all your new Christmas gadgets registered with companies like immobilise, or use product tracking or marking devices like selectaDNA, Redweb or SmartWater. These significantly improve our chances of locating stolen property and returning it to the rightful owners.

I continue to work with Guilsborough Secondary School and have been asked to give a presentation about e-safety, and the safe use of social networks (Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, Pinterest, Snapchat and Ask.fm). Ok, I may have lost some of you but if you have children I would advise you become familiar with these sites and applications, and who your child talks to on the internet.

Taking a Lead on Dog Issues

Every year Daventry District Council deals with a range of dog-related issues including fouling, dealing with strays, investigating dog attacks and barking complaints.

There are lots of positive aspects of owning a dog but it's important to be a responsible owner so your pet is not a nuisance to others or the environment.

Here is some information that causes regular concern in Naseby

Dog fouling

Daventry District Council has a zero tolerance approach to dog fouling in public places - it is anti-social and a health hazard. People who do not clean up after their dog could face a fixed penalty ticket fine of £75. Non-payment of this fine can result in prosecution. A resident of Creaton was prosecuted by DDC in October for a fouling offence and

received a £445 fine (including costs) Dog owners are encouraged to use bags to collect dog faeces and dispose of it in a correct manner. Nappy sacks are ideal for this purpose. Numerous dog waste disposal bins are located around the district.

Call 999 if... there is a **danger to life or risk of injury** being caused, such as a serious road accident or assault a **crime is in progress**, such as a robbery, burglary or theft, and the offender is still on the scene or has only just left the area

the **immediate attendance of a police officer is necessary** - such as where someone is acting suspiciously and obviously about to commit a crime.

Dialling 999 from a mobile phone

Due to the different base stations used by phone companies your call may be answered by a police operator in another part of the country.

Tell the operator immediately where you are phoning from so that your call is dealt with by the appropriate police force.
