

A Chat with...

In this edition of Naseby Natters we are chatting with Paul Reedman, one of the newest members of the Parish Council.



NN. When did you become a Parish Councillor?

PR. I was elected to the council during the summer. I had spoken to Tom Westaway and said I was interested in knowing a bit more about being a councillor. He asked for some background info and the next thing I knew I was elected! I had hoped that my work experiences might prove useful to the village and obviously the Parish Council agreed.





We have been saved this edition by kind sponsors, James and Tina Fanshaw from Oak Farm.

Oak Farm is one of the farms on the outskirts of Naseby and forms a natural border to the Parish with Thornby. Occupied and farmed by Tina and James Fanshawe since 1992 they have rebuilt and

modernised the 250 acre farm from a derelict wreck to provide a modern farm but also to take advantage of the wonderful views over Cottesbrooke and beyond. The garden has been designed from scratch to provide colour and interest for as many months as possible; not easy when it is in such an exposed position.

The hedge rows are thick and

managed to provide cover for birds of all sorts and woodland has been planted at the bottom of the farm to provide a wildlife haven. The farm is now all grass and has a 110 cow suckler herd and a flock of 150 ewes, all from traditional and rare British

breeds. It is managed so there is minimal chemical and fertiliser usage. The farm contains much traditional ridge and furrow pasture land which is now rare and has not been ploughed for

hundreds of years. And yet the farm contains many modern facilities and the best buildings and environment for the animals.

The farm is also the base for Driving for the Disabled in Naseby where Tina's wonderful horse, Nell, gives freedom and pleasure to disabled people when driving around the farm and surrounding lanes.


They have 4 dogs, Timmie the sheepdog, Connie the rescue dog and brilliant athletic lurcher (faster than the fastest sprinter in the world at 35mph!), Fly the whippet (also pretty fast at 28mph!)and Rocket the Cairn terrier. And if that is not enough they also have 8 Chickens and 2 Call Ducks!

When asked why they wanted to sponsor Natters they said "because (a) Natters is great (b) we don't at the moment do much for the village (c) there might be some benefit for our farm if we can sell locally...and Naseby residents will be able to buy better meat from us than elsewhere; but I am just biased!!"

My First Day at School...

I was five years old when I first attended Naseby Primary School and my first day was actually my fifth birthday.

I can remember dressing up and putting on my school coat and taking my satchel with me. Not that the satchel contained much except a pen and pencil and an apple, but I guess I wanted to feel the part as well as look it. I was dropped off at the village school gates and wandered into the large playground. It looked huge!

There were quite a few other kids there just starting too, Geoff Gould, Paul May, Louse Kingsley, Karen Roberts and Julie Perry among them and we were all "The new lot".

The big bell stationed above the school rang and immediatly two lines of students assembled in the playground, one of girls and one of boys. The older boys in the line already took us and put us in the line, it was to be a position that we stayed in during all our stay at Naseby.

After a few moments the two lines were straight and quiet, then the big blue door opened and out came the head teacher. He was tall, stern looking and wore wire rimmed spectacles and a grey suit. He would look up and down the lines of the children before saying "Turn and lead on..."

When the words were spoken both lines of children would turn, boys to the left and girls to the right then unhurriedly and without a word being spoken all kids would walk off towards their respective entrances to the school.

After walking in through the boys entrance I was taken into an area where hats and coats were hung on hooks with names on. I was shown mine and to my amazement my name was already on it! Just opposite my hook was the boys toilet and over the other side of the rack where my coat now hung were the girls.

We were herded into the "Big Class". It was here that all the kids took a place some behind desks, smaller kids by the sides of older ones. We were led to the front - it was our first assembly. A prayer was said and then the tall man in the wire rimmed specs introduced the "New lot" to the rest of the school. It was then that he introduced himself as "Mr Brooks"

A song was sung, accompanied by a piano playing "Mrs Brooks", then as soon as the assembly was started it had finished and I was led away to the "Little Class". This was the starting place for me and my first teacher was the ever stern Mrs Brooks.

I can't remember doing much work that first day only playing with the indoor sandpit, and dressing up in the "wendy house". However I do remember having a mid morning break and then going back into class and seeing Mrs Brooks behind her desk. She had got an everlasting cup of coffee there. Even today the smell of coffee reminds of Naseby School!

Dinner was held in another room at the top of the school and was dished out by an older gentle looking lady by the the name of Mrs Barton. I was given a place at a table. We then said a prayer to say thanks for the food put before us, then I ate what was in front

of me. After that it was dinner break until the bell went at quarter past one then we all lined up again and went through the same process as we had first done in the mornine.

I sat at my desk with a lad named Robert Hill and remember being given a bottle of slightly soured milk. We listened to a story program on the the old wireless set. Older kids in the class were given duties to do. One kid switched the radio on, two more distributed the milk, two more collected the empty bottles. During the rest of the afternoon we coloured in pieces of paper that we had "Taken a line for a walk" through.

At a quarter past three we all stood our chairs on our desks, closed our eyes said a prayer and then walked slowly to the coatroom where I picked up my coat and satchel and then left by the boys entrance. Once outside I ran to the gate where my mum and dad were waiting for me. Then we all walked home.

This is what I remember of my first day at Naseby School 1st September 1968


We run the meeting with a computerised race program with split

Be Safe, Be Seen!

Now that mornings and evenings are getting darker and with winter weather upon us, it can be more difficult for drivers and motorcycle riders to see you whilst you are out.

Please learn about the different types of materials that get you noticed and follow our top tips to ensure you are as safe as possible whilst out on the roads.

FLUORESCENT AND REFLECTIVE The two materials that get you noticed!

Fluorescent material works outdoors in the daylight and is essential in poor daylight or dusk. It reacts to the ultra-violet rays in sunlight, which make it glare. Fluorescent materials usually come in orange yellow or lime green.

Reflective materials work only at night and reflect the light straight back to the driver. Thousands of tiny beads in the material act like cats eyes on the road.


To be a totally safe, consider clothing which combines elements of both fluorescent and reflective material. They enable you to be seen all around the clock.

Remember - fluorescent for day, reflective for night. Knowing the difference could be a matter of life

If you do not possess such material, wear something

or death.





white, bright or colourful. Going out at night in dark clothing can put your safety at risk.



vigilant to ensure

you can be seen on the roads by following these top tips:-

- Bright or fluorescent clothes show up best by day, even in dull or misty weather.
- In the dark, reflective material is best and shows up in car headlights remember fluorescent clothing doesn't work after dark. You can put reflective tape

on your coat or school bag to help you be seen by drivers.





- If there is no pavement and you have to walk on the road, always face the oncoming traffic. This is particularly important in poor light or in the dark.
- Find out about 'walking buses' where children walk in groups

- and are more visible by contacting your child's school or your local council.
- At night cyclists should use a
 white light at the front and a red
 light and red reflector at the
 rear. Consider fitting spoke
 reflectors, reflective pedals,
 tyres and cycle spacers to your
 bike. Protect yourself by cleaning
 the front and rear lights and
 reflectors before you set off. If
 you carry a rucksack on your
 back, attach fluorescent/
 reflective strips to the canvas to
 enable others to see you more
 clearly.

RIDERS:

With winter bringing shorter days, riding out in the half-light and riding a dark coloured horse in dark coloured clothing is courting disaster. Be vigilant on the roads by following these top tips:-

- Always ensure other road users can clearly see you by day and night. Fit fluorescent or reflective leg bands to your horse and wear a fluorescent/ reflective jacket. This can give motorists an extra 3 seconds in which to see you.
- It is far safer not to ride at night, but if you must then you should fit safety lights to the offside stirrup, showing white to the front and red to the rear.

Your Rough Guide to Digital TV and the Digital Switchover...



Apparently the Digital Switchover is the biggest change in Television since colour TV was introduced in 1967. It is also set to keep the UK's programming at the pinnacle of world broadcasting, so with this in mind we've compiled some quick facts for you to digest...

SO WHAT ESSENTIALLY, IS DIGITAL TV?

"Sound and pictures are converted into a digital format and compressed, using as few bits as possible to convey the information on a digital signal. This technique enables several television channels to be carried in the space used by the current analogue signals to carry one channel. Digital signals can be received by standard aerials, satellite dishes or via cable but have to be decoded and turned back into sound and pictures by using a separate set-top box, or a decoder built into your television (an integrated digital TV set/ iDTV)." Still awake???

WELL WHAT ARE THE BENEFITS?


Aside from the 5 usual suspects you're also going to get improved picture (e.g. no ghosting effects), true widescreen, digital quality

sound, more TV and new digital only radio channels like 6 Music (brilliant!) Plus "Red Key" enhanced information services which leave Teletext for dead.

HOW CAN I GET DIGITAL?

In Naseby there are 3 options open to us: Satellite, Terrestrial or through a Broadband digital subscriber line (DSL) for the nerds! Two of these can prove costly but the one off charge for a digital settop box is good value at around £30. The DTI's postcode database should tell us whether we can receive digital or not, but Naseby residents know this to be outdated so don't be fobbed off. Service is definitely available. If you have more than 1 Telly in the house it's also possible to route the signal

from 1 set top
box so you can

simultaneously,
though using the
knowledge of a
local retailer is
advisable (why



Ladybird Ladybird Fly Away Home... (But only if you are a Harlequin Ladybird!)

There are 46 native species of ladybird in Britain (although only 26 of them would be recognisable as such). The most common of these is the bright red seven-spot ladybird.

The Virgin Mary was

often depicted wearing a red cloak in early paintings, and it is thought that this is how the ladybird got its name - referring to "Our Lady". The seven spots were thought to be symbolic of the seven joys and seven sorrows of Mary.

BUT... OUR LADYBIRDS ARE UNDER THREAT FROM HARLEQUIN LADYBIRDS!



These arrived from Asia in 2004 and have spread all over the South East of England. They breed more rapidly, have a greater variety of prey, and will out-compete native ladybirds for food. They can also

cause problems for humans as they will nest in houses, can bite humans when food is scarce, and will also eat fruit when preparing for winter.

There is now a concerted campaign to monitor the spread of these ladybirds and their effect on native species, so check out: www.ladybird-survey.org for information on native ladybirds, and www.harlequin-survey.org to record sightings of the invaders!

Recipe Corner

APPLE & ALMOND DESSERT* Serves 6

(Kindly supplied by Mary Hackett)

A delicious alternative to apple pie and an excellent way of using up windfall apples!

INGREDIENTS:

- 8oz (225g) self raising flour
- · 1 level tsp baking powder
- 8oz (225g) caster sugar
- 2 large eggs
- · 1 tsp almond essence
- 5oz (150g) margarine, melted
- 12oz cooking apples, peeled, cored and sliced
- · loz (25g) flaked almonds

METHOD:

Heat the oven to 325°F/ 160°C∕gas mark 3. Line an 8" (20cm) loose-bottomed cake tin with greased greaseproof paper. Put the flour, baking powder and sugar in a bowl Beat the eggs and essence together and stir them into the flour mixture along with the margarine. Mix well and spread half of this mixture in the tin. Arrange the apples on the cake mixture, then spoon the remaining mixture in blobs over the top of the apples, then sprinkle with the almonds. Bake in the oven for $1^{1/2}$ hours until golden brown and shrinking away from the sides of the tin. Leave to cool for 15 minutes then turn out Serve warm with cream! Yum!

*If your family are not keen on almond flavoured puddings or if anyone has a nut allergy, use a little grated lemon rind in place of the almond essence.

The Naseby Battlefield Project:

As people taking the road to Clipston will have seen, the Project's plans are now taking visible form! At the Obelisk

the volunteer ash has been felled, revealing the monument to public gaze once more, set in the frame of oak intended by the 1920s planting. There will be further work done, such as the laying of the hedge when the season is appropriate. The plans drawn up for the refurbishment and improvement of access by the County Council's contractors were not satisfactory however. The Battlefield Project has commissioned replacements which will be the basis for consultation and an application for planning permission in the usual way.

North of the A14, work has started on Fairfax's Viewpoint, where parking and a viewing platform will give visitors a superb view across the countryside to the





position South
of East Farndon
which was held
by the Royalist
forces in the
early morning of

14 June 1645. It was, we believe, this sight that was behind the decision by Fairfax and Cromwell to move towards Broadmoor where the fighting began. When the construction is complete new planting will enhance the surroundings and encourage wildlife. The interpretation boards will not

only describe the events leading up to the battle, but also the landscape in which the fighting took place. The boards willmake use of the Parish map of 1630 for which permission has been granted by Suffolk County Council which holds the original



Advice on things to do in the garden over the next 2 months. The timing of some jobs may vary across the UK depending on the weather, so always be guided by local conditions.

TOP 10 JOBS: DECEMBER

- 1. Check your winter protection structures are still securely in place 2. Check that glasshouse
- heaters are working 3. Prevent ponds and stand
- pipes from freezing 4. Prune open-grown apples
- and pears (but not those trained against walls)
- 5. Prune acers, birches and vines before Christmas to avoid bleeding 6. Harvest leeks, parsnips, winter cabbage, sprouts and remaining root
- 7. Deciduous trees and shrubs can still be planted and transplanted 8. Take hardwood cuttings

- 9. Keep mice away from stored produce
- 10. Reduce watering of houseplants

TOP 10 JOBS: JANUARY

- 1. Recycle your Christmas tree by shredding it for mulch
- 2. Ventilate the greenhouse on sunny
- 3. Dig over any vacant plots that have not been dug already
- 4. Repair and re-shape lawn edges 5. Inspect stored tubers of Dahlia, Begonia and Canna for rots or drying
- 6. Prune apple and pear trees
- 7. Start forcing rhubarb
- 8. Plan your vegetable crop rotations for the coming season
- 9. Keep putting out food and water for hungry birds
- 10. Prepare a polythene shelter for outdoor peaches and nectarines, to protect them from peach leaf curl
