PARISH QUESTIONNAIRE

Thank you to those of you who took the time to give your responses. These have been collated and will be discussed at the next meeting of the Parish Council on the 4th October. All are very welcome to attend to share your views or just to see what is going on. A full summary of the results and the PC action plan will be available for the next edition of Naseby Natters.

BATTLE HOUSE ON THE CORNER OF SCHOOL LANE

As previously reported this application was opposed by the Parish Council and after permission was refused by the District Council this matter went to Appeal. The Plannine Inspector eranted planning permission for a new house on the corner. This will involve the construction of a new footpath going round the corner at the top of School Lane. The new footpath is very much welcomed by the Parish Council and we are pressing the County Council to continue this footpath all the way down School Lane so that the children no loneer have to share the road with cars

NEW CLLR & VILLAGE CLEAN UP

We welcomed **Stephen Clark** who lives on Newlands onto the Council, and he was co-opted at our July meeting. He got straight to work by joining the rest of the Councillors on the annual village clean up which involved cleaning street, road signs and cutting back vegetation where signs were obscured and other general tidying up. Not much litter needed to be picked up due to the school children had clearly done a fantastic job on their recent litter pick!





MINI FARM UPDATE:

CARVELLS HOME FARM: The start of the summer seemed to come early in April and the worry of no grass soon disappeared when we had the floods in June and July, all be it we were lucky compared to other farmers who lost stock. Hay making was impossible so it has meant we've had to do hay and straw at the same time in August. The sheep were doing well and the trips to market with lambs came to a sudden halt with the devastatine news of Foot and Mouth raising its ugly head again, we weaned the lambs to give the ewes time to recover so they are in good condition going into the winter.

The cows suffered with the constant wet fields, any grass that was there was trod into the mud. We will not know if they have all managed to get in calf until the Autumn.

On a happier note the stable yard

organised a fancy dress around the village and fun games with over 20 horses and ponies taking part to raise money for people a lot less fortunate than ourselves. It was a great success thanks to the generosity of Naseby residents. We raised a fantastic £253.00 for Riding For The Disabled (RDA). A big thank you to all the people that took part on the day and thank Tina, James and Nellie Fanshaw for driving the RDA cart.

DAK FARM: Not much to report at Oak Farm except business as usual with one great big BUT... Foot and Mouth meant that we couldn't move fat cattle direct to slaughter due to the national movement ban. So we were stuck! But it is very important that we allowed the authorities time to eradicate the foot and mouth disease. It's just very frustrating to be caught up in the outbreak a long way from Naseby.

EYES DOWN - DIRTY DOGS

The Fight Against Mess!

Dogs - they may be man's best friend but they are the shoe's worst enemy!

They are Britain's best loved pet; over seven million of us own one and they provide a great excuse for getting up off the sofa and down to the park. But beware - a moment's lapse in concentration can find a pleasant stroll turning into a sticky situation!

Dog mess is a nationwide problem and a real problem for the residents of Naseby!

DID YOU KNOW:

Over 60 individually wrapped bags of poo were recently cleared from the churchyard?

This means that on 60 separate occasions dog owners took the time to bag their dogies 'doo doo' but then couldn't be bothered to put them in the appropriate bins!

At the same time, another kind citizen of Naseby who was so sick of the amount of dog poo found on the verges in Thornby Road, took his wheelbarrow and cleared dozens of bags of dog poo!

MESSAGE FROM NASEBY PC:

Having to clean dog poo off your shoes is very unpleasant. If your dog poos on the grass verge, the pavement or the Recreation Ground (field and play equipment area), <u>PLEASE BE CONSIDERATE AND</u> CLEAN IT UP! Do not let your dog

onto the School Paddock; it is private property and it is completely inconsiderate to expect the children to play in an area plagued by dog poo.



Dog poo can make you ill as it often contains toxocariasis which causes eye disorders, dizziness, nausea, asthma and epileptic fits. Toxacara eggs are infectious 2-3 weeks **after** being deposited

by the dog in its poo. This means that if the poo is left on the

ground, the soil can be contaminated for long after the poo itself has disappeared. However if you immediately clean up after your dog the threat of toxocariasis would be virtually eradicated.

Complaints have been received by the Parish Council over dog fouling for

some time and 5 dog bins have been provided around the village for disposal of the offending poo.

It also gives considerate dog owners a bad name: Responsible dog owners

who always clear up after their pets are also fed up of getting tarred with the same brush as offenders.

Please **BE CONSIDERATE**, pick up

your dogs' poo in a doggy bag or carrier bag, then place it in a dog bin. The bins are on Thornby Road, the Recreation Ground, Carvells Lane, Haselbech Road and on the footpath by the allotments. Alternatively take it home and put it in your black bin.

People who do not clean up after their dogs can be reported to the Daventry District Council Dog Warden (01327 871100) or to the Parish Clerk (01604 740774). Please provide the name and address of the person, details of the dog and the date, time and place the incident took place. The District and Parish Councils can do **nothine** without details of who is leaving dog poop as an unwelcome



surprise for other people to tread in.

PS: Dropping the bagged poo in the churchyard or in a hedgerow is also not acceptable behaviour!

FALLING FOUL

Daventry District Council's Dog Warden, Claire Preddy, is dedicated to enforcing the Dogs (Fouling of Land) Act 1996 and would therefore like to make everyone aware of Daventry District Council's (Fouling of Land by Dogs) Designation Order 1997.



The Dogs (Fouling of Land) Act 1996 applies to;

 Carriageways with a speed limit of 40 miles per hour or less and adjoining verges.

- All footpaths, verges and public open spaces located with in areas subject to 40 miles per hour or less speed restriction.
- Parks and grassland maintained by the District Council.

Those that fail to remove their dog's faeces risk receiving a fixed penalty notice of £50 and failure to pay this notice

could result in legal proceedings and a fine of up to $\pounds1000$ on conviction. All complaints are confidential.



THE BATTLE OF NASEBY

Around the village there are reminders of the Battle of Naseby: the Monument and the Obelisk, the new Battlefield Viewpoints, and road names within the village. This issue we look at...

PART 2: FAIRFAX - as in "Fairfax View"

Sir Thomas Fairfax was the Commander of the parliamentary army called the New Model Army at the Battle of Naseby. His army won the battle against the royal army of King Charles I.



Thomas Fairfax was born in Denton, Yorkshire, in 1612, and as a teenager he fought in Holland. He later served in the Bishops' Wars in 1639/40 and was knighted for his services by King Charles I. When the Civil War began in England in 1642 he assisted his father, Lord Fairfax, in command of the small parliamentary Northern Association army. Known as "Black Tom" for his dark complexion. he and his father had mixed fortunes. in 1643. The Marquis of Newcastle defeated the Fairfax forces at Adwalton Moor giving the Royalists control of all Yorkshire except Hull. In the retreat that followed Thomas Fairfax was shot and suffered severe blood loss, but their forces went on to defend Hull with success.

In 1644 Sir Thomas became a leading parliamentary commander. He led a force to seize Selby in April and then the combined Fairfax forces joined with a Scots army to inflict a decisive victory over the King at Marston Moor in June. This led to the fall of York to the parliamentarians. Fairfax led the siege of Helmsley Castle where he was severely wounded by a musket ball which broke his shoulder.

In January 1645 his reputation was

such that he was appointed commander of the New Model Army as its Lord General. Its core was the army of the Eastern Association and Cromwell was his cavalry commander

as Lieutenant General of Horse. He moulded this new army into a disciplined and efficient uniformed fighting force. In May he laid siege to Dxford, the King's major headquarters. The King abandoned his march north from the midlands and stormed Leicester on 30th May to lure Fairfax from Oxford. The storming and brutal sack of Leicester led the parliamentary Committee for Both Kingdoms to order Fairfax to march north east to engage the Royalist army.

Fairfax, with Cromwell as his deputy, eathered all his forces at Newport Pagnell. The King's forces marched south to Daventry, reachine the town on 7th June. The battle between the armies was fought at Naseby on 14th June. His disciplined force won the day, Fairfax himself leading his regiment in the final stages when he himself captured the colours of Prince Rupert's Bluecoat regiment. His forces remained disciplined throughout and after the battle there was none of the plunderine and lawlessness which marked the royalist and other armies of the day.

He then led his army into the royalist west country, defeating Lord Goring at Langport, and taking Bristol. In

A Chat With...

For this edition the editor suggested our reporter went 'up the clock tower' to chat with **Roger Hillyer** (RH) who for 20 years was Naseby's 'Clock



Winder' at All Saints Church.

- **PR** Before we talk about the clock tell me a little bit about yourself.
- RH Well I've lived in Naseby for 30 years with my wife Jan, who is a Church Warden. We moved here from Northampton when we needed more space for our family. we still live in the same house on Nutcote. For personal reasons we decided to retire earlier this year. we planned to spend more time on our narrow boat, which we keep moored at Napton on the Oxford Canal, but so far that hasn't been possible. I gave up winding the clock as the process is quite strenuous, it was time for a vouneer man and Henry stepped in, it also needs doing on a regular 7 day basis, which means holidays

1646 Oxford fell to Fairfax and the Civil War as over. His health was weak thereafter. He succeeded his father as 3rd Lord Fairfax in 1648. He seems to have opposed the King's trial and execution. He resigned his command in 1650 and retired to Yorkshire. The New Model Army had never lost a battle or a siege. In 1660 he supported the Restoration of King Charles II, and provided the horse that Charles II rode at his Coronation. He died in 1671.

A Chat With

and outings have to be arranged around the winding process. That is why we have an Assistant Clock Winder, Phil Brewin.

- PR Okay, so tell me about the clock.
- RH Would you like to go up to the winding platform?
- **PR** If I didn't Amanda, our editor, would never forgive me!

The entrance to the winding platform is through a small door at the side of the church, there are 39 steps up a stone spiral staircase to the platform and 10 steps down to the crypt. On reaching the top of the stairs there is a small ladder to the actual platform. If you want to go higher (I was persuaded) there is a long ladder to the bell level and then another ladder (I wasn't persuaded!!!) to the top of the tower.

- RH On the winding platform are large locked doors behind which is the 7 day mechanism, it is a pendulum and weights system.
- **PR** So what happens once you are up here?
- RH To wind up the weights for the clock takes 30 complete turns, and 24 turns for the chimes. It is winding up the chimes that needs the energy, although when you are used to it, the 24 turns can be done in one go. The clock was made by Joliffe and Sons of Northampton in



1864. It is serviced each year by a company who specialize in these sorts of clocks.

- PR What happens when the clocks are turned forward or back?
- RH Twice a year the clock is manually adjusted to allow for the change in time. Forward is easy, you just have to move the hands on the small 'mirror image' clock face which is sited on

the mechanism. To move back I found it easier to stop the pendulum for an hour and then come back and start the pendulum again. I stopped time for an hour! Usually no one noticed that the clock had stopped as I normally did it very late or very early, on two occasions I actually went at 2a.m. to do the adjustments. It is very eerie at that time of the morning in the tower, everything creaks and the clock itself gives out a lot of noises, perhaps that's why I only did it twice in the whole of the 20 years. The chimes automatically adjust themselves to the time. The chiming mechanism is a series of wires which connect to the hammer, this is then pulled back to strike the tenor bell.

At this point we climbed the ladder to the bell level...

PR How many bells are there?

...by now I was clinging to the top of the ladder , having declined Roger's *'kind'* offer to join him on the bell level platform!

RH There are 5 bells, but only the tenor bell is connected to the clock. The bells were cast by Hugh Watts



of Leicester in 1633. When the bell ringers are here the hammer has to be held away from the tenor bell. which is done using a small hook, it's down in the church near the bell ropes I'll show you when we ea down. Two of the windows up here have been muffled: this was because the noise of the bells was scaring the horses opposite. Also the wind affects what you can hear. Sometimes it sounds as if the clock is striking the wrong time but it is because the wind is blowing. You may not hear all the chimes in Hall Close but I will hear them in Nutrote or vice versa

Once safely back on the winding platform we waited for the clock to strike 2pm. It was loud but not deafening. Then back down the spiral staircase and into the rain.

I would like to thank Roger for spending so much time showing me around as following my lesson on clock winding and church bells we went inside the church and he pointed out all the numerous historical artefacts that, as a community, we are lucky to have access to.


It's Feedback time!

SO HOW DO YOU SHAUN A SHEEP?



All you wanted to know about sheep shearing and were too afraid to ask!

Sheep shearing and wool production has been an important part of the UK's sheep industry over the last six

thousand years.

The earliest sheep had pigmented coats and moulted allowing farmers to collect the fallen wool but as time went on



breeds developed with improved wool characteristics. There are now over 40 different breeds of sheep in the UK.

By the middle ages wool was the UK's most important output, being exported throughout Europe. Later, as exports declined, production was used domestically in the fast growing cloth industries where technological advance fuelled the industrial revolution and the move from an agrarian to urban society, which led to the development of many of the nation's industrial towns.

THE WOOL PROCESS:

The raw wool is washed (scouring) to remove the grease and dirt. Then it goes thru a process called 'carding' and is where the wool is turned from staple to sliver form (which separates the fibres). After that it is combed to straighten long fibres and remove the shorter ones. Then it is spun which pulls out the fibres and adds twists to make a continuous, strong thread. The wool can be dyed between any of the stages in wool processing.

TERMINOLOGY

Ram or Tup = male sheep Ewe = female sheep Lamb = baby sheep

FACTS:

British Wool Marketing Board - tonnes of raw wool produced 2005 Australia = 326,193 UK = 28,647

DID YOU KNOW?

Wool is wear resistant, provides good insulative properties and can absorb up to 30% of its own weight in moisture without feeling wet!

DAY IN THE LIFE OF A SHEEP SHEARER:

Once a year, usually in the warmer

months, sheep are gathered for shearing. We went along to Carvells Lane Farm, owned by Bridget and Mike Baker, on a very, very hot day in June to see how it is all done...

Ian and Chris are both 44 and have been best mates since they were teenagers and have been shearing for almost as long. Chris lives in Clipston



and is a plumber in real life and Ian lives in Long Buckby and is a postman during the day. (Pete is the 3rd pair of hands and is from Watford, a farmer who only started shearing last year.)

So when did you start sheep shearing?

Chris: I started when I was 18 so a few years ago now

How did you get into it?

Chris: I was a farmer originally so it was a necessity for me. I started shearing my own sheep, then I helped out a neighbouring farm, word got round and I ended up helping out more and more farms. It took off from there really.

Why sheep shearing?

Ian: Well as Chris said, for him it was a necessity, but I was only supposed to be helping him out - we have been working together ever since!

Who trained

you? Chris: I was self-taught really, I watched my dad for a long time, then started with







shearing half a sheep, worked my way up to a whole sheep and perfected it over time

How do you become qualified?

Chris: Nowadays, when you can do 12 an hour, you are considered to be a professional but you can go on a training course to learn the trade

How many farms do you cover? Ian: We used to do 15 but now it's about 12. Enough!

How long does it take to shear a sheep?

Chris: It depends on the size of the sheep really.

Ian: ...and how accommodating they are!!!

Chris: Less then a minute is really good. Bridget has just timed me and I did one in 1 minute 29 seconds. So not bad!

Is there a sheep shearing season?

Ian: Yes, the season lasts around 6-8 weeks. Sheep are fully sheared once a year, usually any time between mid May to the end of June, sometimes into the beginning of July - depending on the good old British weather!

How many sheep can you shear a year?

Chris: We do about 3,000 a year on average. Today we'll shear about 250



sheep in total. To put it into perspective though - in Australia they shear the same number of sheep in a week as the UK does in an entire year! Sheep Shearing is a full time occupation for them where as in the UK it tends to be a part time basis.

Ian: Shearing in the UK is usually carried out by shearers from Australia and New Zealand. They travel the world to shear sheep all year round. This "shearing circuit" is seen as a way to save money to start farming. They see shearing as something to be proud of and to master. Whereas in the UK it is just looked at as really hard back breaking work. It's 25°c today, we'll get thru litres of water otherwise we get really dehydrated, it is a very long day, so it certainly isn't glamourous by any means!

FACTOID: In any given year approximately one third of all British sheep are shorn by New Zealanders. The shearers get to see the world; the farmers get the best. This is due to the way shearing is viewed in New Zealand: as a science and an art. Those who shear competitively approach their sport as any top athlete does, with fitness, training and commitment.

How do you keep track of how many

you have done?

Ian: We have a tally counter that we press each time - not very technical but it works! They are digital ones now.



What happens once you have sheared the sheep?

Ian: Once sheared the fleeces are then

taken by the 'wrapper' who remove any soiled areas and then fold the fleece on itself. They



then place them into a 'wool bag' - a very large sack basically! - which is hooked onto a special metal frame. Once full, usually takes about 40-50 fleeces depending on their size, the bag is then sewn up using special thread called sisal, which is a very strong white fibre obtained from the leaves of the sisal plant.

Chris: The Wool bags are then taken to the Wool Trade Central Wool Growers where they are assessed, by eye and touch. Each individual fleece is graded and placed into groups of the same type and quality, ready for sale by auction.

FACTOID: The Wools fibre diameter is

quoted in microns - 1 micron = 0.001mm - the lower the micron figure the finer the quality.

What is the wool used for?

Ian: Raw Wool, which is the wool from the sheep's back still containing all the grease and dirt, all goes to the general wool market trade

Chris: Mainly turned into socks and carpet in the UK.

Ian: The UK tends to import wool from Australia and New Zealand to make high-end items like suits. Our wool over here is just not good enough quality unfortunately.

How much is a single fleece worth? Chris: There are lots of different

breeds of sheep and they all produce different types and qualities of wool. These sheep are Mules and their fleeces are only worth about £1.50-£2 each - so not much. Different parts of a fleece are more valuable than others though, for example the neck area is better quality as it has a waviness to it, called the crimp. Generally the



springier and wavier the wool the better the quality it is.

Ian: Higher-grade wool such as Merinos from Australia can be worth as much a £7 each.



How much wool does a single fleece make?

Chris: You can get about 30 balls of wool from a single fleece,. depending on the size and quality of course.

FACTOID: Did you know that 11b of wool can be spun into 20 miles of yarn? It can take 10 balls of wool to make a single jumper?

Are both Rams and Ewes sheared? Ian: Yes, but the Ewes are far easier!!!

Chris: The Rams are a lot bigger and stronger and therefore harder to handle. But on the plus side you get more money for shearing a Ram

How do the sheep feel about it? Chris: They don't enjoy it much as it can be quite traumatic for them, but we get it over with as quickly as we can so as not to stress them out too much

Ian: They certainly show little gratitude! We often get bitten for our hard work!

Why are sheep sheared, is it for practical or financial reasons? Chris: It used to be financially very lucrative but is no longer done for the money.

Ian: Since sheep breeds no longer

naturally moult, shearing is necessary to prevent them from overheating either when indoors, or outside during hot summer months. It also helps prevent maggots, so is definitely done for a practical reason

How does it improve their general comfort levels/guality of life?


Chris: Once they are sheared they are so much happier and much more active than they were before. As soon as they are let back out into their field you'll notice they'll be grazing all day where as before they would have been laying down under the shade of a tree to keep themselves cool



How do the electric shearers work? Chris: It is a Lister electronic motor. Lister Shearing is the longest established manufacturer of shearing equipment. It has a flexible drive shaft attached to the motor at one end and the hand piece with the clippers attached at the other. The motor turns the cable and

operates the clippers. You just have to make sure the clipper blades are kept well oiled.

Ian: There is also the harness that supports your weight and prevent you hurting your back. There are 2 types. The 'Warrie Back-aid Shearine Frame', which has a flexible strap that you put your head and arms through and supports you under your chest. Then there is the 'Crutching Frame' which is slightly different as it is open

on one side. This is used mainly for clipping sheep as you are constantly eettine in and out. I prefer this sort as it has a solid bar underneath your rib caee which helps prevent you being kicked or head butted by the sheep!

We flew 14 hours to Abu Dhabi where we had a quick 3 hour stop before continuing our flight to Sydney. Once at Sydney, 130 of us split into 4 oroups: Wallabies Koalas Worm

groups; Wallabies, Koalas, Wombats and the Skippies.

Each group went to a different city in New South Wales. The Skippies (myself included) went to Wollongong where we stayed in a youth hostel for 4 days. Whilst in Wollongong we visited Symbio Wildlife Park, where we had the opportunity to feed kangaroos, cuddle koalas, hold snakes and touch Tasmanian Devils!

For the next week we were doing conservation work for Conservation Volunteers Australia (CVA) in Kangaroo Valley. The weather was very cold there; we stayed in basic wooden cabins which

had no heating, no plug points, no mirror and a very cold concrete floor!

There was a common room and kitchen, and each of us took it in turns to make either breakfast, lunch or dinner.

There were 3 showers and 3 toilets for 30 of us to share and we were allowed only 3 minutes each in the shower due to a short water supply.

I had 2 hot water bottles, 2 duvets, 2 blankets, a sleeping bag and I was fully dressed at night as temperatures sometimes dropped below freezing. Our cabins were in the middle of nowhere and seeing a wombat, possum or kangaroo was just the norm.

One evening we made a campfire in the woods; we went on a wildlife night walk and then toasted marshmallows where

we also enjoyed a spectacular view of the stars.

Also, during my stay in kangaroo valley, I discovered a long lost relative..... One of



the Australia team leaders was called Mark Gould! I am yet to research how he is related to me.

After a week of 'roughing it' we were all so pleased when it was time to go to Sydney. We stayed in Sydney Central YHA which was a 20 minute walk from the Harbour.

Whilst in Sydney, we climbed The Sydney Harbour Bridge, caught a ferry to Manley which had a beautiful beach and fantastic shops, The famous Bondi Beach, The Jewish Museum, The Oz Jet boat ride and a meal at the revolving restaurant in Sydney Tower.

The Sydney Harbour Bridge is the largest single span bridge in the world and signifies engineering excellence. The sweeping curve over Sydney's world-famous Harbour is 503 metres



long, 134 metres high and 49 metres wide. The weight of the steel work alone totals 52,800 tonnes and includes 6 million rivets!!

Officially opened on Saturday 19th March 1932 by the Premier of the State of New South Wales, Jack Lang, the bridge has become an enduring international symbol of Sydney.

The Bridge is currently celebrating its 75th birthday!

This trip was a truly life-changing experience for all team members. As well as changing our lives, we have provided more life changing experiences for children with terminal cancer.

I would like to say a huge thank you to my family and for all those who helped me fundraise this memorable



Suffice to say it's taken many months and re-writes to meet the exacting requirements of the many government agencies. Now at last we enter the final consultation stages which will result in Naseby having its own unique set of supplementary planning rules and euidance (SPD).

During September and October the various Daventary District Council Plannine and Strateev Groups will aeree a version of the VDS document for the formal 6 week "Interested Parties and Community Involvement" consultation process.

As part of this, during

November/December the Parish Council and additionally everyone in the village who is interested, will be invited to review the document and make any suggestions for improvement. We will let you know how you can get involved via the next issue of Natters

After the formal consultation process is completed, the final document will be produced and then, as they say, it should be plain sailing to become an official SPD in early 2008.

Gardening Tips!

TOP 10 JOBS: SEPTEMBER

- 1. Divide herbaceous perennials
- 2. Pick autumn raspberries
- 3. Collect and sow seed from perennials and hardy annuals
- 4. Dig up remaining potatoes before slug damage spoils them
- Net ponds before leaf fall starts
- 6. Keep up with watering of new plants, using rain or grey water if possible
- 7. Start to reduce the frequency of houseplant watering
- 8. Clean out cold frames and greenhouses so that they are ready for use in the autumn
- 9. Cover leafy vegetable crops with bird-proof nettine
- 10. Give everereen hedees a final trim TOP 10 JOBS: OCTOBER
- 1. Clear fallen autumn leaves regularly 2. Cut back perennials that have died
- 3. Divide herbaceous perennials and rhubarb crowns
- 4. Move tender plants, including aquatic ones, into the greenhouse
- 5. Plant out spring cabbages
- 6. Harvest apples, pears, grapes & nuts
- 7. Prune climbine roses
- 8. Order seeds for next year
- 9. Last chance to mow lawns and trim hedees in mild areas
- 10. Renovate old lawns or create new grass areas by laying turf

TOP 10 JOBS: NOVEMBER

- Clear up fallen leaves especially from lawns, ponds and beds
- 2. Raise containers onto pot feet to prevent waterlogging
- 3. Plant tulip bulbs for a spring display next year
- 4. Prune roses to prevent wind-rock
- 5. Plant out winter bedding
- 6. Cover brassicas with netting if pieeons are a problem
- 7. Insulate the greenhouse from frost bubblewrap works well
- 8. Stop winter moth damage to fruit trees use grease bands around trunk
- 9. Put out bird food to encourage winter birds into the earden
- 10. Use a seasonal bonfire where this is allowed - to dispose of excess debris unfit for composting
