TEENAGE SKATEPARK COMPLETED!



The Skatepark was completed on the 6th August and seems already to be a success. It is comprised of a ¹/₄ Pipe, Funbox and Grind Rail for those of us who are not knowledgeable of such things!!!

These components, along with Tarmac area, cost £14,300. The Seating Shelter cost £3,500 and was set into an existing concrete base, thereby saving us some money!

The cost of the Park was covered by an award of £10,000 from Biffa, £5,000 from Sportsawardforall, £2,000 via the precept and £1,300 from fund-raising.

Biffa had asked for a progress report during the construction of the park and this has been written by Councillor Pope, seen on several occasions at the Village Hall clicking away on her camera. An opening ceremony involving the local media is to be arranged.

This project has taken just under two years to complete and I would like to thank everyone for their help and support.

HOLIDAY TIME!

The Parish Council is currently enjoying its 'summer recess' and there is no August meeting, which indicates that even the flow of planning applications has dwindled.

PARISH PLAN:

The completed Parish Plan looks and reads very well and I hope that villagers find it useful and interesting. The Clerk has already received some positive feedback especially concerning A14 noise pollution. A new approach on how to deal with this has been suggested by a knowledgeable villager and this will be an item on the next meeting's agenda.

VILLAGE DESIGN STATEMENT:

The draft of the Village Design Statement has been sent to Karen Britton at Daventry District Council and we await her response. Further details concerning this are provided separately.

BENCH. TABLE AND BINS:

The bench and table at the Playeround have proved to be a success and is well used. The bench and bin, along Thornby Lane should be in place sometime this month. It will be situated further out of the village than the previous bench (about 1/4 of a mile to be more precise) and affords a splendid view over the Northamptonshire countryside. The site was chosen after close liaison with dog walkers and joggers (i.e. Liz Capell told me where to put it!). Thanks to Mel Hoyle for installing the benches.

Broadband Success (for some that is!)

On August 11th, as scheduled, the Guilsborough exchange was enabled for broadband internet access giving speeds 10 times faster than ordinary dial up connection. It does seem that there are still problems for some houses within the village however, probably caused by the distance from the Guilsborough exchange.

Before broadband can be ordered, your ISP (Internet Service Provider) will perform an initial test to see if the line is suitable. In Naseby we are right on the 6km acceptable limit. It seems that the majority of 740 numbers will pass this test, but that some 743 numbers will fail. We know of one household which has two lines: The 740 number is fine. but the 743 number fails the test!

If this initial test is passed, the ISP will instruct BT to perform some work at the exchange. As a part of this BT perform additional tests, if these fail, BT will not enable the line for broadband

Unfortunately this may mean that some houses in Naseby cannot receive broadband at the current time.

ALL IS NOT LOST THOUGH

However a recent series of trials in Milton Keynes, which increased distances from the exchange, resulted in the followine BT announcement on 18th August: "From September 6, 2004, the reach limit for the 512kb/sec ADSL services will be removed BT is also increasing the range for 1Mb/sec premium services from 4km to approximately 6km, making 1Mb/sec ADSL available to 96% of homes and businesses connected to a broadband exchange." This will hopefully mean that everyone in the village will have the option to receive broadband in a few weeks time. More news next issue!

The Fitzgerald Arms Pub has been in the Steane family for 21 years this coming October. It is a traditional family

run country pub with a relaxed and friendly atmosphere. Sally Steane has just taken over a major part of the running of the pub after returning from travelling and is often found behind the bar. She is also very busy with the running of a new service that the pub will be providing for functions, events and marguee hiring.



Sally really enjoys living in Naseby, I asked her what she liked about livine in the village, she said "I have been living in Naseby for nearly 21 years now, so there must be something good about the place! The primary school was, and I believe still is, fantastic. I loved being part of such a small school. I think the village itself also looks presentable. It is obvious that the village people take care to make their homes look neat and in keepine with its traditional village style. The history is also interesting giving us 'Nasbiens' a place on the map! And although I hate the noise from the A14 I love the fact that we're not too far away from an airport! The pub has definitely been a very important part of why I like Naseby, it has given me and many

There is also a second bar area to the left side of the oub that has music, discos and other entertainment, including a pool table and a jukebox. To the rear of the pub adioining the garden is the Stables Restaurant area where food is also served in a non-smoking environment during the weekends. The Stables is a lovely dining room situated in a separate building to the main pub, just off the rear garden.

THINKING OF THROWING A PARTY OR FUNCTION?

The Fitzgerald Arms is now providing an excellent Party & Function service which Sally will be running. Events can be held at the Fitzgerald Arms with the Stables restaurant area becoming the perfect function room, with the added bonus of having its own fully functional bar and toilet facilities so that you can keep your party private from the pub itself. This function room alone is perfect for smaller events such as anniversaries and corporate functions. The marquee can be joined onto the room for larger events such as Wedding

Receptions, Christenings and Birthdays. There are various special occasion menus available on request to suit your needs ranging from 4 Course meals to buffets



The white marquee used is fully lined and is also available for hire privately, so you can use it for any kind of private function you are holding at home. Along with this there is the option of having a mobile bar and/or cold buffet service as well as assistance with planning your party decor should you require it.

Naseby Village Design Statement

WHAT IS THE PROCESS INVOLVED WITH PRODUCING A VILLAGE DESIGN STATEMENT?

At the Parish Council Meeting in May 2004, volunteers were asked to form a steering group to commence work on a Village Design Statement for Naseby.

Following the display, on the village notice board, of the minutes and a specific poster advising the villagers of the proposals a group of interested parishioners (both villagers and Parish Councillors) was formed; their terms of reference being to produce the Village Design Statement.

SO HOW DID IT ALL START THEN?

Prior to commencing the Statement a Parish Plan had been produced. This process, which took some 20 months, was signed off by the Parish Council in July 2004. It involved a dedicated team of volunteers to actively seek the views of all parishioners which was done through questionnaires (which were distributed to every household in the parish and returned by 229 residents, about 53% of the electoral roll), regular feedback and consultation. The questionnaire invited people of every age to express their views on

all aspects of village life and how it could be improved.

A Future Needs Day was also held in April 2003 which was attended by over 100 villagers (i.e. circa 25% of the electoral roll) representing a good cross section of the village and age groups.

HOW DID YOU DECIDE WHAT IT NEEDED TO INCLUDE?

The extensive and detailed outcome from the Parish Plan exercise forms the backbone of the Village Design Statement which will be used in conjunction with Daventry District Council's existing guidance notes on design to identify in greater detail the design criteria against which proposals will be judged.

Several meetings of the steering group have taken place over the past couple of months to enable the Statement to be compiled and an Open Day (advertised via a Parish Council Meeting/poster on the village notice board and mention in the Harborough Mail) was held on 17 July, when further village input was sought.

WHY DOES THERE NEED TO BE A VILLAGE DESIGN STATEMENT?

The Countryside Agency has long supported the rich and varied nature of the countryside and the rural settlements. The Agency strongly believes that this richness and variety forms an important part of the beauty and distinctiveness of the English countryside and heritage.

In more recent years the Agency has become increasingly concerned

about the threat to this variety from standardisation and poor design. In answer to this threat, one of the ways that has been proposed, tested and now launched on a national scale is the 'Village Design Statement'

Development has to proceed. Much of what we see today is very different from the shape, form and purpose of the original settlement. However there is much about our village that we wish to retain. Future change needs to be managed to protect local distinctiveness

The Village Design Statement will assist in the management of change and ensure that new development is appropriate to its surroundings and in keeping with local character.

WHAT IS THE THE PURPOSE?

A Village Design Statement aims to describe the distinctive character of this historic village as it is today, and highlight the qualities that are valued by the villagers. It is researched, prepared and written by villagers. This ensures local knowledge, views and ideas are contributed to and incorporated in the Village Design Statement.

The Statement is intended to apply to all scales and types of development ranging from new build to small-scale alterations and extensions as well as highways, traffic and safety matters.

WHO IS THE STATEMENT AIMED AT?

- Statutory Bodies and Public Authorities
- Planners, Developers, Builders







- Architects and Engineers
- Local Community Groups
- Village Residents and Businesses

The Village Design Statement is to be used as a planning tool - it can help to improve the design in the village by being incorporated as Supplementary Planning Guidance. Whatever it covers must be relevant and complementary to the local planning situation.

A Village Design Statement should contain descriptions of the visual characteristics of the village in terms of:-

- The countryside and landscape setting
- The form of the village as a whole
- The characteristics and details of the buildings and spaces within the village

The Statement should also answer the key questions of-

- What does this say about the character of the village?
- Will this help to inform the design decisions of designers and developers?
- Will this be compatible with local planning policies?

SO WHAT'S NEXT?

A draft document has now been completed and forwarded on to Daventry District Council for their comments and feedback. We will update you in the next issue - so watch this space!

The Art Gallery

First of all I would like to thank all Exhibitors for entering their work for show or sale. There were a total of **81 paintings** which made a respectable 1st Exhibition and the standard was high. We had many favourable comments to verify this!

Most of the work was done in Watercolour, there were a few Oils and a few done in Pastel and there was one 'Encaustic' (a method of paint, wax and heat). The Subjects were varied from Still Life. Life Study (nudes), Wildlife, Landscape and Street Scenes, Boats on Waterways and Seascapes, Flower Studies. Abstract Landscapes and Surreal paintings. Wildlife Support



John Hargreaves of Meadow View in High Street, Naseby, has farmed 300 acres between East Farndon and Marston Trussell for 22 years. His participation in the Countryside Stewardship Scheme was featured recently in Northampton Chronicle and Harborough Mail articles.

Under this Scheme he receives an annual subsidy from Defra (Department for Environment Food and Rural Affairs) to encourage a beneficial habitat for wildlife by keeping 100 acres free of cultivation, added fertilisers, lime or general spraying. These 100 acres are kept for grazing cattle on land grassed down from the 16th Century on the rig and furrough principle. Mapboards on nearby footpaths indicate how to obtain access to these acres.


Birdlife is encouraged by not cutting hedges too low – not always easy to reconcile with modern farming. One example is the Blackbird which prefers to nest 5-6 feet above ground so needs a minimum hedge height of 7 feet to provide cover above a

nest. The desired hedge height increases to 10 feet for Goldfinches, Greenfinches and Linnets, while Warblers prefer to nest in brambles or grass near ground level so are affected by mowing of verges.

John's reported interest in Tree Sparrows originated almost by chance, when trying to discourage crows and magpies from damaging crops. The only bird apprehended was an unusual sparrow which turned out to be the rarer Tree species. These are shy of human contact, but are flock birds often nestine near water. They normally live round erain in the farmvard, but disperse for breeding. One such flock of 200 have been noted near Welland Park in Harborough. A family of Spotted Flycatchers has been seen around the farm, also Green and Spotted Woodpeckers, while Painted Lady Butterflies are attracted by the clover.

John's garden at Meadow View is a paradise for bees, butterflies and insects with foliage and grasses deliberately left long. In addition to old fashioned phlox and roses for scent he has planted a variety of nectar plants and wild flowers like lady's bedstraw, meadow cranesbill, harebell and teazles.

TREE SPARROW

Scientific Name: Passer montanus

Status: Widely but locally distributed in England, Wales and lowland Scotland. Marked decrease in population in recent years.

Habitat: The tree sparrow is mainly a bird of open farmland with hedgerows and freestanding trees or small isolated woods.

Food: Seeds and insects

Description: Sexes similar.

Smaller and shyer than a house sparrow and more active, with its tail almost permanently cocked. It has a chestnut brown head and nape (rather than grey), and white cheeks and collar with a contrasting black cheek-spot.

Size: 14cm

Digital TV Entertainment for all the Family with Freeview

If you go to the Freeview web site (www.freeview.co.uk) and enter a Naseby postcode, you will be told that the service is not available. WRONG! Several people in the village have found that they can receive Freeview signals.

We were advised to buy one of the more expensive decoder boxes (expect to spend £80-£100) rather than the cheaper (£60) ones, and that we may need a new TV aerial. Luckily for us (but not so good for Capell Bros - sorry Geoff!) the existing aerial worked fine!

Robin Oldfield of 44 High Street competed in this year's London Triathlon and raised over £1,600 for the Prostate Cancer Charity.


Over the two day event a total of over 8,000 people competed in sprint and full triathlons, both individually and in relay teams.

KIDS QUIZ ANSWERS (from back page)

The Naseby W.I.

At our May meeting Members debated and voted on the three Resolutions to be put before the National A.G.M., held in Sheffield in June. These Resolutions sought to uree the Government:

- 1. 'To put into place legislation to combat trafficking of women and children for sexual exploitation and forced labour'
- 2. 'To prohibit the cultivation of GM crops in the UK'
- **3.** 'To make substantial funds available annually to the Air Ambulance Service.'

Naseby Members voted in favour of all three Resolutions, having no problem with the first two, but some considerable difficulty with the third. 
