NEW COUNCILLOR ON BOARD!

The council is pleased to confirm the co-option of Scott Westaway as the new councillor to fill the vacant position following Alison Stokes departure to pastures new. We wold like to welcome Scott on board!

TREE PRESERVATION ORDERS

As mentioned in the last issue Rachel Booth, Daventry District Council's Conservation Officer, gave a very comprehensive talk on the ins and outs on of applying for tree preservation orders and the criteria they looked for - the trees must be of an amenity value, have a degree of public benefit and have an intrinsic value. Trees can be considered if they contribute to the landscape. support wild life, may screen a development or eyesore. Anybody can apply for an order to be considered and a review is to be undertaken by the PC. Up to date documentation was also provided on how to apply for buildings to be listed via English Heritage.

NASEBY WEB SITE

A web page is in the process of being created for the Council by Wyn Sleeman (with design input from Amanda Green). Wyn advised he had undertaken a detailed review of several bespoke web pages that were currently available but his preference was to design a page that in simple terms would be a "tree like" structure with the PC being the trunk with numerous branches coming off representing the various village organisations. It would also have facilities to incorporate mail lists, adverts etc. One of the main advantages will be the control of input which would be delegated to the different organisations on an individual basis. The web address will be: www.naseby.org and initially will be piloted with the PC together with Naseby Natters.

BEHIND THE SCENES...

The Council actively continues to try and improve the village amenities and infrastructure and thanks is given to all the parishioners who signed the petition in support of the resurfacing of the roads/lanes in the village. We await the outcome but experience dictates that when dealing with Northants County Council it is a long slow process. A request for a feasibility study to improve and enhance the village entry signs, despite numerous letters is no further forward some 12 months on!

VILLAGE DESIGN STATEMENT

The initial draft of the Village Design Statement has been returned by Daventry District Council with several suggested amendments and these are now being considered by the Working Party. Hopefully a revised final

version will be complete within

BUDGET PROPOSALS

The PC will be reviewing their budget proposals, most likely in December, which will be before the next issue of Natters. This is an important process and input from the village is welcome so please watch out for this item being scheduled as an agenda item and please do come along to this or any other meeting.

PLANNING STRATEGY CONSULTATION

This important subject was discussed at length at one of the PC meetings and a copy of the response is detailed below: Following on from your recent presentation, the Parish Council met to discuss the initial proposals and wishes to make the following romments:

- · Naseby to remain as a restricted infill village with the expectation that that definition is rigidly applied. The village has almost reached saturation point with virtually all areas in the village having been developed. Prior to being classified as a restricted infill village there was a commitment to provide 50 new dwellings - this commitment has been fulfilled and together with infill has seen an increase of new housine at the extraordinary level of 37% over the past ten years. The intention to concentrate new development in the town of Daventry and away from the villages seems positive.
- Affordable housing via a Housing Association development (which took place in the last couple of years) met the demand for such properties with the site only being over subscribed by one. The PC will continue to review the need for this type of housing on a regular basis.
- Applications with proposals to demolish existing properties (except where the properties are derelict/uninhabitable/dangerous) to create infill space are strongly opposed as are any proposals for back/front fill development.
- Recent development has seen the creation of a fair proportion of larger type properties and as there is now considered to be sufficient

housing of this nature, future proposals should be declined.

- With the pressure placed on the District Council to provide more housing it is strongly recommended that the first consideration must be for the District Council to undertake a full review of its own land bank. There is still council property with large gardens (which in the year 2005 are now often viewed as a burden) that could be developed by demolition and rebuild/infill/back fill to ensure maximum benefit is derived from the District Council's own land stock.
- Certain areas within the village need to be specifically earmarked not for development. The village is currently producing a Village Design Statement which will cover this point but specific areas within the village confines are:
 - The school playing field
 - Land adjacent to the two public houses
 - Recreation ground
- The authorities above Parish Council level need to give more support to the views/ recommendations put forward by the Parish Council
- The Parish Council supports the principal of village confines. With concerns about recent levels of development in the village running high and no information on what, if any, development may be imposed in future there may be a need to earmark other land outside the confines specifically not for development.
- As previously mentioned a Village Design Statement is in the course of being produced and the views expressed therein must be adhered to

THE BATTLEFIELDS TRUST

includes the original three-person working party with Martin Marix Evans in the chair. Peter Burton of Sibbertoft and Michael Westaway of Naseby to whom have been added Roger Hillver of Naseby and Anne Haddon of Sibbertoft together with John Kliene from Alderton. Lord Naseby and Lord Hazelriee have consented to become the Project's patrons.

NASEBY BATTLEFIELD PROJECT

PHASE 1: The complete development of interpretation information, viewpoints and visitor facilities for Naseby Battlefield will take some years and will depend on the availability of land, access routes and funding. However, the most important findings of the last decade, which have redefined our understanding of the action, can be appreciated without entering on the traditional site and are the basis for Phase 1.

East Farndon: The Royalist army first deployed to the south of the East Farndon to Oxendon road, a site from which the Parliamentarian army near Naseby windmill (the Obelisk monument) could not be seen. This was crucial to Prince Rupert's decisionmaking. Planning permission has been obtained and a viewpoint is to be placed here. Two interpretation boards, one on the battle and one on the natural history and wildlife, will be installed.

Naseby, Clipston Road: From a point north of the modern A14 Fairfax and Cromwell could see their enemy, and could also see that it would be necessary to move westwards to tempt Rupert to attack. A viewpoint is to be placed here, also with two interpretation boards.

The Obelisk, Naseby: This was the site of the windmill, the Parliamentary rendezvous. The existing interpretation board, giving information now

superseded, is to be replaced. The Cromwell Monument, Naseby to Sibbertoft Road: The interpretation board is to be renewed.

Bloodyman's Ford, Welland Park, Market Harborough: Now crossed by a bridge. the River Welland was forded by Royalist forces in the early hours of 14 June 1645 on their way to East Farndon. After the defeat of his army. Charles I was, it is reported in contemporary writines. almost captured here. An interpretation board is to be installed

VIEWING PLATFORMS: Viewing platforms will be made of wood over an earth bund and will be constructed on two levels. The lower level will raise adults thirty inches above the ground so that their eye-level is that of a mounted man: the officers of the armies viewed the landscape from horseback. The upper level, another eighteen inches up, will do the same for children and for wheelchair users. Interpretation boards will identify key features in the landscape and relate the story of the action to them. The site will be planted with meadow grasses and flowers and with trees.

PHASE 2: There are three or four more sites on the line of retreat over Moot Hill to the final stand at Wadborough that deserve signs and maybe viewing platforms.

PHASE 3: We hope to see the creation of a visitor centre for we are unique among the important British battlefields in being without one.

FUNDRAISING: Fundraising, both national and local, will be required to fund Phasel at an estimated cost of £200,000. and Phases 2 and 3 are likely to cost well in excess of f.1 million

NASEBY BATTLEFIELD PROJECT -APPEAL: This is an appeal by the Battlefields Trust to raise money for the installation of viewpoints and interpretation boards at a number of locations on and around the area over which the Royalist and Parliamentarian

armies fought on 14 June 1645.

Should the appeal fail or the undertaking be curtailed through insufficient funds or for any other reason the money already raised will be paid into the Trust's Interpretation and Conservation Fund which can be used on other sites. If you do not want your donation applied in this way please say so below, indicating whether you wish your donation to be returned to you or whether you wish to be consulted on its future use. The same will apply if there is a surplus, but no return of money will be made if. calculated on a pro rata basis, the amount due is less than £1.

All was well in my world, the usual crop of family problems, too much month at the end of the money and the usual politics at work, but my home is my castle, its where I come home to unwind, enjoy life, its my world and your welcome to come into it by invitation only.

Shop Update

directly involved had plenty to keep them busy and entertained, with



The Naseby W.I.


Since the last edition of Naseby Natters, the Annual General Meeting of the Women's Institute has been held at the Royal Albert Hall. It



was attended by around 5000 delegates from all around the U.K. with guest speakers including Jane Fonda, Bill Bryson, Baroness Helena Kennedy Q.C., and Julia Unwin of the Foods Standards Agency.

The resolutions which were put to delegates this year were concerned with 'Care of our Environment' and 'Farmgate Milk Prices.'

The first called on members 'to take further action to reduce waste and conserve resources in their own homes and communities: to lobby manufacturers, retailers and decision makers to reduce waste in production, packaging and transportation of public and consumer goods.' The second one urged members 'to do all in their power to raise public awareness of the unfair difference between the retail prices of milk and price paid to the farmer.' Naseby members having voted for both resolutions at their meeting in May were pleased to note that they were also passed at the Royal Albert Hall Meeting in both cases by majorities of more than 99%.



ENVIRONMENT: Judging by the number of full recylcling boxes which line the streets of Naseby every week, it would appear that people here do care for the environment and play a large part in its conservation. However, it would be interesting to know how many people think of the environment when accepting non-biodegradable plastic bags to carry home even the smallest item of shopping!

DID YOU KNOW?

It is estimated that there are now more than a staggering 15 billion plastic bags distributed in the UK every year, most of which are non-recyclable and have to go into a landfill site or be burnt, releasing damaging carbon dioxide into the atmosphere.

FARMGATE: As for farmgate milk prices, it is understood that it currently costs the UK dairy farmer between 18 and 23 pence to produce a litre of milk but since the year 2000, average farmgate milk prices have varied between 16 and 20 pence per litre. And what do the consumers pay in the supermarket? More than 30p per litre. Not all the blame for the difference lies with the supermarkets; dairy companies don't always pass back price increases to the farmers. Is it any wonder that it is estimated that more than 40 dairy farmers are leaving the business every week?

On a lighter note (!) at the July meeting in Naseby, Mr. Brian Dennis spoke to members about beekeeping. He told them pretty well all there is to know about beekeeping and bees (what amazing creatures they are!), doing so in a very humorous way and

answering questions as he went along. Afterwards, members were able to buy his home-made candles and delicious honey.

There was no meeting during August, as members and their guests went to Elton Hall near Oundle, where they toured the house and gardens.


FILM REVIEWS Willy Wonker (PG)


