

Village Update

Naseby Parish Council

RE-SURFACING OF THE VILLAGE ROADS/LANES

Following the completion by parishioners of a petition to endeavour to persuade the County Council to do something positive about the deplorable state of the roads in the village, the petition was put, by Dist. Cllr. Millar, before the Full Northants Council and their official response is:

"All roads within Naseby village have been surveyed with regard to the condition of the roads' structure, wearing course and edge deterioration during the current financial year.

The average "failure rate" as measured by our inspection machinery is between 10% and 15% although there are two roads that are markedly worse, with failure rates of 40%.

With current resources we are prioritising the repair of roads with failure rates of 70% or above and hence have not programmed work in Naseby at the current time.

We will of course keep this situation under review "

Notwithstanding the above the Parish Council continues to push for improvements and we can only be thankful that we do not live in a village where the "failure rate" is above 70% as we can only assume access would have to be by hovercraft or helicopter!!

STARLINGS

A recent press article said that a mumuration of starlings was in the top ten best bird sights in the UK. This is probably true because the swirling and whirling of the thousands of birds currently being seen is truly spectacular (albeit, for obvious reasons you need to be safely under cover to watch it).

However, the downside factor is the incredible mess being experienced by everyone and potential health hazards. The Parish Council intends to monitor the situation for next winter and, if they re-appear in December, professional advice will be sought on how best to deal with the situation.

-----STOP PRESS-----

By the time you receive this newsletter the Starlings may have moved on to pastures new. As you may be aware the Parish Council have decided enough is enough and to take action now by hiring some loud hailers to help scare the Starlings away. Sad though it is to see them go it has become a necessity to do something about the sheer numbers circling around the village each night.




Naseby Methodist Church 🙈

The run up to Christmas was as busy as ever, with many exciting events planned and undertaken.





The origin of Mother's Day



The earliest Mother's Day celebrations are thought to originate in ancient Greece and Rome where there were relebrations in honour of the mother of gods, known in Greece as Rhea and in Rome as Cybele. A ceremony dedicated to the worship of Cybele was incorporated into the Roman celebration called Hilaria which took place in March. It is believed that this was adapted for a Christian ceremony dedicated to the Mother Church.

Most Sundays in the year churcheoers in England worship at their nearest parish or "daughter church". Centuries ago it was considered important for people to return to their home or "mother" church once a year. So each year in



the middle of Lent. everyone would visit their "mother" church, or the main

church or Cathedral of the area.

Inevitably the return to the "Mother" church became an occasion for family reunions which led to the tradition of children. particularly those working as domestic servants, or as apprentices, being given the day off to visit their mother and family. It was quite common in those days for children to leave home for work once they were ten years old.

The origin of giving flowers on this day is thought to stem from the

17th century custom of servants given the day off to return home to celebrate, were often allowed to pick flowers from their master's land to take home to their mothers.

People also used to take a "mothering cake" (a type of fruitcake) or a "simnel" (a pastry filled with fruit). Simnel cake is a rich fruitcake covered with a thick layer of almond paste or icing, and decorated with eleven small balls of almond paste - made to signify all the apostles except Judas

The custom of Motherine Sunday died out in Britain, but a similar "Mother's Day" custom was established in the US in 1890 by a lady called Anna Jarvis. The custom became popular in Britain after World War Two, following the

Mother's Day is on Sunday 26th March 2005 in the UK although the date changes each year. It is celebrated on different dates in other parts of the world.



Mother's Day is the bieeest flower selling occasion in the UK despite all the competition from other products. 35% of all adults buy flowers

for their mothers or for their children to give to their mothers at this time. Last year favourite flowers for Mothers Day included roses - still the favourite flower of UK women according to the Flower and Plants Association.

Hitchcock Hits Naseby!

Alfred Hitchcock could have made a great movie, Bill Oddie a 'Super Nature Watch', but it's left to lesser mortals to make the best of it and see the beauty of the enormous gathering of Starlings gracing us with their presence this winter!

We're not the only place they have chosen as their playing field. Melton Mowbray is also among their favourite haunts. In the Daily Telegraph (6th - 11th Feb 06) a small article explained why there are so many... "Starlings from Siberia have joined ours because of the extreme winter there".

But this is not the first time starlings have gathered in Naseby. According to Mrs Joyce Vials, there were visitors lone

aeo, but not quite in these quantities!

Besides the 'white' patios and pavements, splashed windows Tthe Methodist chapel windows have just been done before they arrived!!!] dirty cars and other blobs...we're sure we are not the only ones who are enjoying the daily spectacle of their play!

A MURMURATION OF STARLINGS: A muted way to describe the chattering, a clattering or congregation of a group of starlings as they come into roost each evening

In flight, they have pointed, triangular wings, and when they come in to land they look a little like Harrier aircraft



When a bird of prey is around, the starling flocks split into smaller, tight groups, or all form one huge flock, wheeling around the sky to distract the predator. As each new squadron joins the flock the sight of thousands of starlings in the air together is truly magnificent, and the sound can be equally impressive (if not deafenine!).

Starlings seem to have an insatiable appetite and will eat











just about anything from anywhere (except starling proof feeders) and throw much of it about while they are at it! As well as flying in flock they feed in flocks too, and so several birds are usually feeding in this lively manner which is a sight to behold.

Quite a few garden birdwatchers loathe Starlings for this because of the way they seem to descend on food in large numbers and eat everything within a few minutes (and they can empty the bird bath of water through their furious splashing as well).

This attitude is somewhat unfair as Starlings are very gregarious birds. So feeding quickly in flocks is, after all, what they have evolved to do. However, it is easy to see this behaviour as greed, and the concerned garden bird feeder, who may have a limited



budget, may resort to rationing the amount of food the Starlings can get.



Apart from the local car wash and window cleaners doing very well from all this (not to mention tarpaulin sales!), the species is not doing very well at the moment despite them descending upon Naseby in their thousands.

It is thought that the birds may have declined by over half during the last 25 years. Cats, modern farming methods and new house designs are among the factors being blamed for the population falls. Changes in agricultural practice, such as the increased use

THE FACTS



Description: At first glance starlings appear quite dull and blackish, but closer inspection reveal a beautiful plumage. They have black feathers with an iridescent, purple or green sheen. In winter they have prominent white speckles.

Nature: Noisy, gregarious birds and excellent mimics often incorporating the sounds of other birds, frogs, mammals and even machinery into their song.

Habitat: Common throughout UK. Build untidy nests in holes or cavities in trees or buildings. Also use nestboxes.

of pesticides and the loss of pasture and unimproved grassland, have reduced food sources available to the birds resulting in young starlings not surviving their first year.

So don't be too hard on them - enjoy their amazing aerobatics while you can!



If any lady would like to come alone to any of our meetings, they would be very welcome.




