Behind the scenes, your Parish Council and its members have continued to work hard, supporting the village's Good Neighbour support network group, that was created during the early days of the pandemic. Other local groups have also been busy, working to re-open community buildings and organise socially distanced community events.

Therefore, this issue is packed full of information to bring you up to speed on local issues/updates and up and coming events.

So, till the next (Christmas) issue, please take care and stay safe!

CHAIRMANS REPORT 2019/20



COUNCILLORS - we have 8 Councillor seats but we have been running with only 7 during the year. Our current Councillors are Paul Reedman, Steve Howat, Penny Nicholson, Lyn Dyett, Phil Carter, Rachael Johnson and Stephen Davies.

Thanks to all Councillors for their work in the last year but particularly to Steve Howat as Vice Chairman and to Penny Nicholson who is stepping down. This will leave us with 2 vacant seats which we would dearly like to fill.

Due to Corona virus outbreak, the period of service for existing parish Councillors has been extended by a year until elections are held in May 2021.

MEETINGS - in the year we have had 10 normal plus 2 additional meeting and the Annual Meeting of the Parish.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS - there were no major applications during the year and 12 applications of various types have been examined and commented upon with one of these being considered several times due to amendments.

One notable application was for the new ballet school which was a welcome addition to the village.

FRANCIS JACKSON DEVELOPMENT - construction of all 20 Francis Jackson houses at Hammond Mews and Catton Close have been completed and occupied.

The Parish Council finally received £2,000 from the County Council which was originally allocated to provide a bus stop pole and sign in the village. Many thanks to the original landowners and to Francis Jackson for facilitating this.

COMMUNITY INFRASTRUCTURE LEVY - we received no additional Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) contributions this year and currently have £7,524 which arose from the two new houses adjacent to the village hall corner.

GRANTS – the Parish Council Grant awarded during 2019/20:

- (a) Village Hall Committee £1,080 for tree surgery and £2,214 for village hall roof repairs.
- (b) £1,000 to the local First Responder organisation to purchase emergency equipment.
- (c) £104 to Ducklings Pre School.

PLAY AREA IMPROVEMENT - installation of the new play equipment was undertaken by our contractor Kompan and it was formally opened on the 25th October. Funding has come from the following sources:

- Francis Jackson S106 money £25,850
- Lottery Grant £10,000
- Daventry District Council Grant. £15,000
- Friends of Naseby Play Area
- Fundraising, Just Giving and
- Waitrose £1,100
- Parish Council £16,220

Total to date £68,170

In addition the Kelmarsh Wind Community Benefit (KWCB) Charity awarded a grant to the Friends of Naseby Play Area which funded the steel fencing between the village hall and tennis courts.

Following the very wet winter a problem of water ponding within the junior zone has become apparent and it is intended to install land drains to deal with this at additional cost.

GRASS CUTTING - 2019 was the final year of 3 year contracts for our two grass cutting contracts. Following a competitive tender exercise, new 3 year contracts have been awarded to Maximow to continue cutting the village hall playing field and to Countrywide Grounds Maintenance to continue cutting road verges, the churchyard, the village hall play area and area adjacent to the car park, the public open space adjacent to Hammonds Mews and the paths from High Street alongside the allotments and between the village hall and Cottesbrooke Road.

BUSES – the 60 service to Northampton and 59 service to Market Harborough ran for the year with a single shopping bus operating Monday to Friday in each direction.

Parish Councils along the routes funded £15,000 of the cost with the balance provided by Daventry District Council after the County Council funding was withdrawn at the end of 2018/19. Naseby contributed £2,700. Centrebus withdrew from their contract midway through the year and were replaced by UNO operating the same timetable.

For the year 2020/21 Northamptonshire County Council have indicated that they will fund the service provided that parish councils contribute £15,000 again. At the time of writing it looks likely to continue at least until mid July (end of school summer term). What happens thereafter depends on what restrictions are in place due to the progress Corona virus.

DAVENTRY LOCAL PLAN - the Daventry Settlements and Countryside Local Plan (Part 2) was adopted for Daventry District Council in February 2020. It is now the document against which new development is judged for the period up to 2029.

KELMARSH WIND COMMUNITY BENEFIT - it is good to see that a number of grants have been made to village organisations during the year in addition to the play area fence, including for the purchase of stage lighting and sound equipment for use at the village hall.

PRECEPT 2020/21 - the precept demand was increased from £30,500 in 2019/20 to £31,000 for 2020/21 a 1.6% real increase, whereas your new council tax bill shows a 2.0% decrease. This is due to the council tax calculation undertaken by Daventry taking into account the new houses in the village which have been occupied during the year.

COUNTY COUNCIL REORGANISATION - the enabling legislative orders were finally passed to enable the reorganisation of Northamptonshire into two Unitary Councils from April 2021. Although the elections which were due to be held on the 7th May have been cancelled due to the Corona Virus pandemic it is believed that the start-up of the two new Councils will not be delayed. For 2020/21 the County Council and the 7 district councils including Daventry will continue to operate.

VILLAGE HALL - the Corona Virus has unfortunately forced the closure of the hall and cancellation of some events which will inevitably cause loss of income for the Village Hall Management Committee in the short term. The hall is a valuable village asset which once again staged a well-attended pantomime and more recently its first cinema event.

VOLUNTEERS - thanks to our volunteers assisting with moving and analysing results from the speed information display unit and our volunteers checking the defibrillator

Also thanks to Margaret Anderson for her Village Pride work which has now come to an end and Sarah Farrell and her team who deliver Naseby News.

CORONA VIRUS OUTBREAK - we are in unknown territory with the outbreak and parish councils have been advised to adapt to new circumstances. Public council meetings are in the short term to be replaced by electronic /telephone meetings and the play area (and village hall) have been temporarily closed.

PARISH CLERK - many thanks to our (new) clerk Josie Flavell who joined us in early April 2019 taking over from Katrina Jones. She has proved to be very capable and efficient and has always provided us with sound advice.

KELMARSH WIND FARM COMMUNITY BENEFIT – TRUSTEE CHANGE

The KWCB Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) distributes funds from the Kelmarsh Wind Farm between the four parishes of Naseby, Clipston, Kelmarsh and Haselbech, and has 8 trustees with 2 representatives from each of the 4 parishes.

The founding Naseby representatives were Scott Westaway and Paul Kelly who were both heavily involved in lengthy negotiations with the wind farm owners and the Charity Commissioners, starting in late 2016, and culminated in the CIO being able to consider its first grant awards in early 2019.

Paul Kelly stepped down in April and on behalf of the village the Parish Council thanks Paul for his considerable input.

Naseby's replacement trustee, nominated by the Parish Council is Richard Nicholson who commenced in August.



KELMARSH WINDFARM COMMUNITY BENEFIT (KWCB) UPDATE Charity No. 1177667

Having awarded funding to various good causes in Naseby, we are really looking forward to receiving even more grant applications over the coming months.

So if you are a community spirited individual (meeting our grants criteria) or a member of an active group, club, or organisation operating within Naseby and engaged in, not for profit or charitable projects, which will benefit our community, it's really worth the effort of getting the necessary grant award paperwork together, and sending it in, as soon as you can.

Also, please note that we can now accept grant applications for large cross-parish charitable projects benefiting communities from two or three, or all of the KWCB-CIO parishes of Clipston, Haselbech, Kelmarsh and Naseby and the wider-area.

NORTHAMPTONSHIRE LOCAL GOVERNMENT REORGANISATIONS UPDATE – September 2020

The reorganisation of the County into two unitary authorities, West Northamptonshire Council and North Northamptonshire Council is still happening on the 1st April 2021 but some of the processes leading up to the change have had to be adapted due to the restrictions of the pandemic.

The May 2020 elections for councillors to sit on two short lived shadow councils were cancelled. These elected shadow councillors were due to continue on as full councillors to the new councils. Instead all existing councillors from the district councils and the county have become councillors to either the West or North Northamptonshire shadow councils.

Elections for 93 councillors to the new West Northamptonshire Council will now take place in May 2021, at which point all of the existing district, borough and county councillor positions will be abolished.

An executive committee has been formed for each of the shadow councils. For West Northamptonshire this is comprised of two senior councillors from each of Daventry District, Northampton Borough, South Northamptonshire and the County Council.

Regular meetings are taking place involving councillors supported by council officers which are considering many different topic areas. The original aim of carrying out some restructuring before the new council goes live has been reined in due to the loss of time and Covid-19 issues.

The most important target is that on day one, 1st April 2021, council services will continue as seamlessly as possible, legal obligations will have been met and a budget and council tax rates are in place.. Initially most council staff will work from their current place of work with restructuring following in due course.

The first Chief Executive Officer for West Northamptonshire Council, Anna Earnshaw, has been appointed and will take up her post in October. A further three West Northamptonshire director level appointments have been made for Finance, Legal, and Adult Social Services and also for a director post shared between West and North Northamptonshire for Children's Social Services.

DAVENTRY LOCAL PLAN UPDATE – SEPT 2020

Daventry formally adopted the Settlements and Countryside Local Plan (Part 2) in February 2020 which covers the period from 2011 to 2029.

As a Secondary Service Village Naseby can accept limited development within the settlement boundary defined on the Naseby Inset Map. The boundary tightly encloses existing development and residential opportunities are limited.

Daventry's housing land availability is in excess of the minimum 5 year government requirement therefore speculative housing applications on sites outside the settlement boundary should not normally succeed.

PLAY AREA NEWS

If you have visited the playing field recently you will have noticed the new play area fencing and self-closing safety gate by the car park, which has been funded by the Parish Council.

You may also have seen the sandy lines in the junior zone and between the village hall and sports court. These mark the positions of new land drains connecting to a ditch at the side of Haselbech Road. They should greatly reduce the areas of standing water experienced last winter and make the play area more usable and less muddy during prolonged wet weather.

Half of the cost of this work has been funded by a grant from Kelmarsh Windfarm Community Benefit to the Friends of Naseby Play Area group. The other half has been paid by the Parish Council.

The anniversary of the opening occurs on the 25th October and it's unfortunate that it had to be closed for such a long time during 2020 due to Covid-19. Since reopening when lock down eased, it has been really pleasing to see so many children using the play area, often with accompanying adults.

FIX MY STREET

Northamptonshire County Council are the Highway Authority and as such are responsible for the maintenance of public highways and footways. Street lighting is a Parish Council responsibility in Naseby.

If you see a highway fault, a pothole, a broken manhole cover, flooding on the road, blocked gulley, damaged road sign, damaged kerb or many other things, you can report it to Northamptonshire County Council yourself using Fix My Street Northamptonshire. This has replaced their original reporting system called Street Doctor Northamptonshire

It is easier to use than Street Doctor and allows photos to be attached. You can also check if anyone else has already reported the fault before you proceed.

You can opt for your name not to be publicly attached to the report but do need to provide an email address. Acknowledgement and feedback on your report is via your given email address and includes a location plan and details for the reported fault.

The initial acknowledgement is fairly fast and in due course a response should be received even though it annoyingly may be something like "thanks for the report but following inspection the fault does not meet the standards for repair but we will monitor it".

You do not have to report faults via the Parish Council but of course you can do so, if you wish to.

59/60 BUS SERVICE UPDATE

The revised service is now operating with a 60 bus to Northampton on Mondays, Wednesdays and Thursdays and a 59 bus to Market Harborough on Tuesdays and Fridays. Both services allow for shopping with up to 3 hours 48 minutes in Northampton or 2 hours and 15 minutes in Market Harborough.

Passenger numbers are down due to Covid-19 fears but the service, provided by UNO, is secure until the end of March 2021. An annual subsidy of £15,000 has been shared between parishes along the route.

What happens after April 2021 is unknown and will be affected by the policies of the new West Northamptonshire Council, by Government funding plans and by transport policies.

History indicates that if a rural bus services is lost, it may be a very long time before it is restored, if ever.

NASEBY W.I.



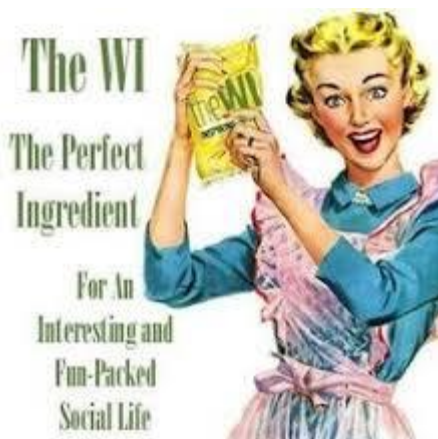

Dear Naseby residents and friends,

How much has changed since my last letter, and what a very different world we are living in.

The world continues to face many challenges - and no doubt will face new ones in the months ahead – as the journey through the pandemic continues. However, in many places, there has been a real sense of community and solidarity, a willingness to put others first, to protect the most vulnerable, and care for the sick and fearful. And that is something to both acknowledge and celebrate.

We have recognised with renewed clarity that our lives are relational, that isolation is not a natural state, is difficult to cope with, and not often something we would choose. We are used to the freedom to come and go as we please, to meet with friends and family, to shop when we like, and where we like.

As we are discovering, though, imposing restrictions was, in many ways, much easier than lifting them, particularly if they cannot be lifted completely and need careful consideration and monitoring. It is difficult, too, to know what impact the autumn and winter months will have on the path of the virus, so we can only guess as to when we can get back to meeting freely, and without social distancing.

Having said that, many groups have found new ways of meeting and staying in touch whilst adhering to all the rules and regulations. Amongst them, many churches have provided virtual worship throughout, and are now beginning to meet for socially distanced worship in church buildings – including in Naseby. Of course, worship (virtual or otherwise) is just the beginning – Christians are sent out from it into their communities to speak of God's love, and to be actively compassionate in caring for those in any kind of need.

We have obviously had to think creatively, and find new ways of doing this but, from my perspective, it has been hugely encouraging to see, that in the midst of turmoil and uncertainty, love flourishes in Naseby and across the Benefice. And where love is, there we meet God.

NASEBY VILLAGE HALL

Many thanks to all those people who made a donation to our recent fundraising effort to the Calor Rural Communities Fund via Crowdfunder.

We raised a total of £3259.00 less Crowdfunder expenses of £97.77, transaction expenses of £123.43 and VAT of £44.24, net total raised £2993.57. We also have a total of £350.00 in cash which has been donated by people who are not on the internet, and £130.00 donation from a lady in the village who made face coverings that have been sold in Naseby HQ, these will be paid directly into the village hall bank account. We will also be applying for the gift aid on donations totalling £2264.00.

255 of you supported our campaign, and ensured we made the shortlist for a grant, unfortunately we were unsuccessful in obtaining the £5000.00 grant, Calor did however award us a £500.00 grant so our total fundraising amounted to £3759.00.

I want to say a big thank you to you all on behalf of the village hall management team. By the time of this publication the work on the gable end wall to make it waterproof, and the manufacture and installation of acoustic tiles should be complete. We are also hoping to cure the leak in the roof above the stairwell so all your donations have been put to good use on the fabric of the building to make it secure, watertight and acoustically comfortable. Again, many, many, thanks for your support.

NASEBY POP-UP GOOD NEIGHBOURS SCHEME

At the beginning of the Coronavirus Lockdown, a small group of people got together to look at how we could help support the Residents of the village, and our own Good Neighbours scheme popped up!

A Food Bank at Naseby HQ was also set up. The Parish Council supported both initiatives and sent leaflets to every household.

DOG MESS IN NASEBY

One of the most regular complaints we have as a Parish Council is about the amount of dog mess in paths and playing fields in Naseby. It would be unfair to blame the large canine population in Naseby; it is the responsibility of the dog owner to ensure that the dog's mess is cleaned up. Although there are a great number of owners in Naseby that do clear it up, there are still some people who feel it is unhygienic or not something they should have to do. However, it is a real health hazard to leave it where it lies - on pavements, the village hall field, the sides of Thornby Road and Carvells Lane, it's also against the law.

Everyone has to share the same recreational space and there is nothing worse than having to constantly look for dog poo to prevent you or your children stepping or even falling into it.

The Law

Anyone who fails to clear up after their dog can be issued with a Fixed Penalty Notice of up to £100. If the case goes to court this could cost the owner or person in charge of the animal up to £1,000.

The law states that being unaware a dog has fouled or not having a suitable bag is not a reasonable excuse.

A Public Spaces Protection Order (PSPO) is in place across Daventry District. The PSPO states that people in charge of a dog must:

- Pick up after the dog
- Carry the means to pick up after the dog
- Prevent the dog from entering a fenced-off children's play area
- Put the dog on a lead when requested by an authorised officer
- Keep the dog on a lead around the cafe area at Daventry Country Park
- Put their dog on a lead in graveyards, cemeteries and memorial gardens
- Put their dog on a lead near schools (when the school is open)
- Walk no more than six dogs at one time (six dogs per adult).



Health Risks

All faeces contains bacteria that can cause stomach upsets if ingested. However, the greatest risk to public health from dog faeces is toxocariasis. Toxocariasis is an infection of the round worm, spread via unwashed vegetables and dog faeces. Young children in particular are at risk due to their weaker immune systems and because they are more likely to expose themselves by ingesting the eggs. A puppy can pass as many as 15,000 eggs per gram of faeces, and they are a major source of environmental contamination.

Each *T. canis* female can lay up to 700 eggs a day. These are passed out when the dog defecates and can survive for up to three years in soil. After two to three weeks of warm weather the eggs develop into an embryo state, containing larva - this is when they become infective to dogs and people. The larvae try to migrate through the human body as they would in a dog's, but the human body treats them as foreign material, which causes a reaction and tissue damage.

There are two types of toxocariasis: visceral larva migrans (VLM) and ocular larva migrans (OLM).

In VLM, the larvae reach the liver, causing inflammation and symptoms such as abdominal pain and pyrexia. Most people recover.

OLM occurs when a migrating larva reaches the eye. It causes a granuloma to form on the retina, causing significant visual impairment and in severe cases even blindness.

Reducing the Risk in Naseby

- Pick up after your dog every time your dog makes a mess. Keep a packet of bags next to the dog's lead as a reminder to take them with you.
- Ensure you regularly worm your dog - every three to six months. Use a prescription wormer from a veterinary surgeon.
- Watch your dog carefully if off lead, especially on the playing field where the risk of toxocariasis being caught is higher.
- Bag It and Bin It
- Report it



Reporting dog fouling- Daventry Council

It is helpful to officers if when reporting dog fouling you are able to include the following information:

- The time, date and location of incident
- The frequency of the offence, if it happens regularly
- A description/breed of the dog
- Any other descriptions to help identify the offender, including their name and address if known.

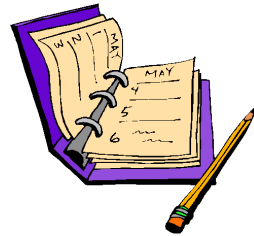
