- You must be aged 18 years and over, eligible to vote and have lived or worked in the parish of Naseby for 12 months or more, or within 3 miles of the parish boundary.
- Any elector can identify a potential councillor and nominate candidates for election and have the right to elect a councillor who represents their interests.
- Unless ten electors of the Parish give written notice to the Proper Officer of West Northants Council (Electoral Services, West Northamptonshire Council, Council Offices, Lodge Road, Daventry, NN11 4FP) requesting an election to fill this vacancy, the Parish Council will fill the vacancy by co-option at its next available meeting, or by election if the vacancy falls within an election year.

PARISH COUNCIL CHAIRMAN'S REPORT 21/22

COUNCILLORS: We have 8 seats which were all filled at the end of the year. Our current Councillors are Paul Reedman, Steve Howat, Lyn Dyett, Rachael Johnson, Stephen Davies, David Hall, Antonia Collins, and Margaret Anderson. Thanks to all Councillors for their work in the last year but particularly to Stephen Davies as Vice Chairman and to Lyn Dyett who is stepping down after 4 years.

MEETINGS: In the year we have had 10 normal meetings and a finance subcommittee meeting. Following a long period of virtual meetings, we resumed physical meetings in May 2021 in the Methodist Chapel. Unfortunately, the Annual Meeting of the Parish which involves residents, clubs and village organisations could not take place in 2021 due to Covid restrictions.

A working group created to deal with the June 2022 Jubilee celebrations has had 4 meetings so far and is chaired by our Clerk.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS: 18 planning applications of various types have been examined and commented upon. There have been no major applications.

COMMUNITY INFRASTRUCTURE LEVY: We received no additional Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) contributions, and the balance of our CIL fund has been spent this year.

GRANTS: No Parish Council Grants have been awarded during 2021/22.

PLAY AREA: The play area continues to be well used and some minor work has been undertaken including replacing the seats to the covered blue seat unit and installing additional grass reinforcement carpet adjacent to the Zip Wire start platform. Thanks to the team of Councillors who carry out a weekly inspection of the play area.

GRASS CUTTING: 2021 was the 2nd year of the 3 year contracts for our two grass cutting contracts. Maximow continued cutting the village hall playing field and Countrywide Grounds Maintenance continued to cut road verges, the churchyard, the play area, the area adjacent to the village hall car park, the public open space adjacent to Hammonds Mews and the off-road paths from High Street alongside the allotments and between the village hall and Cottesbrooke Road.

BUSES: Buses operated by UNO provided a 60 service from Naseby to Northampton on Monday, Wednesday, and Thursday and 59 service to Market Harborough on Tuesday and Friday. Parish Councils along the routes contributed to the operational costs with the balance provided by West Northamptonshire Council. Naseby's contribution was £1,604. Following the refusal of some councils to contribute, the 60 route towards Northampton changed to pass through Brixworth rather than via Chapel Brampton and the stop at Cold Ashby was removed.

BENCHES: Three benches were installed around the village hall playing field. These are constructed from recycled waste plastic and should require little or no maintenance.

VEGETATION CLEARANCE: Extensive clearance of shrubbery and vegetation was undertaken to open up view's of the historic Battle Obelisk from Clipston Road. Clearance of overgrown vegetation in the All Saints churchyard was also undertaken to enhance its appearance.

HOUSING NEEDS SURVEY: A housing needs survey was carried out by West Northants Council and a report was issued in August 2021. This indicated a need for 5 additional affordable housing units over the next 5 years.

CCTV: A CCTV system has been installed on the outside of the village hall which covers the playing field, car park and play area.

KELMARSH WIND COMMUNITY BENEFIT: The charity has 8 trustees who are nominated by their respective parish councils and serve for a period of 3 years. There are two each from the qualifying parishes of Kelmarsh, Haselbech, Clipston and Naseby. Richard Nicholson and Scott Westaway served as our two trustees during the year however Scott stepped down in March 2022 and has been replaced by Stephen Davies.

PRECEPT 2022/23: The parish council precept has been maintained at £31,500 for 2022/23, the same figure as for 2021/22.

VILLAGE HALL: The village hall opened up in early 2022 after the relaxation of Covid restrictions and an attractive programme of events has been put in place by the Village Hall Committee. Improvements to the hall kitchen and some additional paths and paving are planned for the coming year.

A Wind Farm grant for a 2nd village defibrillator has recently been awarded to Naseby Football Club. It is to be mounted on the village hall wall and will be maintained by the Parish Council.

GYM EQUIPMENT AREA: We are investigating the provision of a small exercise area within the village hall playing field containing a number of exercise machines. We would hope to obtain grants towards this.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT REORGANISATION: West Northamptonshire Council became operational on the 1st April with its 93 councillors elected in May 2021. Its responsibilities cover those previously exercised by Northamptonshire County Council and the 3 former district councils (Northampton Borough, Daventry District and South Northamptonshire). Naseby sits within the Brixworth electoral Ward, and our 3 Councillors are Jonathan Harris, Cecile Irving-Swift and Kevin Parker.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT REORGANISATION: There has been little apparent change so far in the way the new Unitary Council relates to constituent parish and town councils. Refuse and rates are being collected, schools are operating, parks and car parks are open etc.

Our main point of contact is on planning applications where we are consulted on applications within our area. To date there has been little change in the systems being used or the council staff involved. There are 3 separate Local Plans, one for each of the former district / borough councils and there are currently 3 distinct online planning application recording and management systems which do not all offer the same functions. A new common system is proposed which will require West Northants Council to install a new computer system.

A second area of parish interest is Highway Maintenance which at the moment is still being carried out under the former county council contract covering both North Northamptonshire and West Northamptonshire areas. New contracts are being tendered during 2022 for the separate North and West councils' areas.

A substantial body of work has already been undertaken on a programme of transformation of the organisation and functions of West Northants Council, but this has been hampered by work from home guidelines. It will potentially take 5 to 10 years for the full efficiency savings of the new council to be realised and will entail wide ranging changes to contracts, staffing, and property.

There have been hints at devolving some additional functions down to parish and town councils, but details are not yet available. A survey of West Northants Council assets within parishes and of services provided to parishes is currently under way.

COUNCIL TAX ENERGY REBATE



The government has announced a £150.00 Council Tax energy rebate for those residents who live in properties in Council Tax bands A to D (inclusive).

You must be the liable person for Council Tax and the property must be your main home as of 1 April 2022.

Direct Debit Customers

Residents who pay their Council Tax by Direct Debit will begin to see the £150 Council Tax Energy Rebate credited into their bank account from the 16 May 2022 onwards.

If you are one of several residents who are jointly liable, we will make the payment into the live bank account that we have on record for the household. The bank account name must match one of the residents on the Council Tax bill

If you have not had a Council Tax instalment claimed by Direct Debit by 1 May 2022 in respect of the 2022/23 annual Council Tax charge, then you will need to follow the application process outlined below for Non Direct Debit customers.

Non Direct Debit Customers

All households who do not pay their council tax by direct debit, will receive a letter inviting them to apply via an online application form using a dedicated website. All letters will be issued from the week commencing 16 May 2022 onwards.

All applications will be subject to a series of validation checks before any payments are made, this will include the requirement to upload a bank statement dated within the last three months to verify your bank account details

Once in receipt of your letter to complete the application process you will be redirected to grant approval which is the system used by Ascendant Solutions Limited. You will require a unique passcode, which will be contained within your letter, to complete the application.

If you are unable to access or complete the online form you will be able to make application in writing, further details will be provided in your letter. To ensure that all eligible residents receive the benefit of the £150 Council Tax energy rebate, any residents that have not made an application by the 31 July 2022 will have their Council Tax account credited with the £150 payment.

ALL SAINTS CHURCH NEWS

Dear Friends.

I wrote this letter just before all the excitement of the Platinum Jubilee festivities! I do hope the village was able to enjoy the many different opportunities there was to celebrate the long and faithful reign of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth.

For many of us, she is the only monarch we have known, and has been a constant figure throughout all the changes that have taken place, from political to personal, from national to local. Her longevity is certainly impressive but, more than that, for me it is her steadfast commitment to her role that is exceptional. Yes, she is insulated from many of the challenges and difficulties faced by the average man or woman in the street – she doesn't know what poverty feels like, has not had to cope with the relentless demands of a young family or elderly relative, hasn't lacked social or medical care at any time.

She has, though, known family breakdowns, scandals, and devastating personal loss and grief when loved ones have died - and she has experienced them not just in private but right out there in the public eye, for all to see and all to have an opinion on.

Most of us will know how easy it is for our words and actions to be misinterpreted, be taken out of context, cause hurt when none was meant, make a situation worse when all we intended was to make it better!

For the Queen, her every action, every public or overheard word, is up for analysis, dissection, and interpretation. Assumptions are made, sides are taken, and soon we are all piling in with our assessment and judgement.

Yet despite this constant scrutiny, the relentless demands of always being Queen - never just a face in the crowd, but the face the crowd has come to see – despite all this, she has remained faithful to her role as our monarch, has made it her life's work, dedicated herself completely to serving her country.

And she has been faithful to her work because she has profound faith in the God who called her to serve and anointed and commissioned her. Her faith is part and parcel of who she is in a deeply personal sense, of course, but also in the role she has lived out. She has had the strength to go on, to remain true to her calling only because she understands that God is with her, guiding, strengthening, and upholding.

So, although it must at times cause her deep pain and distress, it is not the judgement of the world that matters to her, but rather the judgement of God. She knows herself to be his beloved child, a disciple of Christ, and whatever the difficulties faced, and criticisms heard, she can be confident that he knows her completely, all the secrets of her heart, and the truth of her intentions.

Each of us is called by God, just as she is; each of us, like her has a role to play in building his Kingdom. If we can undertake our callings, and live out our roles, whatever they are, half as well as the Queen, then this country and the whole of creation will be a better place because of it.

VILLAGE HALL PRIVATE EVENT JUSTIFICATION

Naseby village hall trustees recently hired the hall and recreation ground to a 'private event' over a long weekend. We asked for villagers to respect the wishes of the event organisers and refrain from using the recreation ground during that period. I thank all those that went elsewhere for this 3 day period to exercise their dog or indeed themselves. A tiny minority in the village objected to the recreation ground being off limits for this event, this is our response.

We only close the recreation ground (never the children's playground) after due consultation with an event organiser, many factors are considered including Health and Safety, Security, type of event, and number of participants expected. It is of course in the interest of most event organisers to have the public admitted to their events, only in exceptional circumstances is a private event requested or allowed.

Events such as these bring in much needed revenue which enables the trustees to run and maintain the facilities on behalf of the village. Improvements recently carried out include a complete new kitchen, new thermal curtains, roof repairs and repairs to the damaged goals in the sports court are about to take place.

We are also planning further improvements, providing a proper footpath to the sports court to make it accessible to wheelchair users, extending and improving the car park, refurbishment of the changing rooms and of course changing the heating system and installation of a suspended ceiling to reduce our electricity costs and lower our carbon footprint.

We apply for grant funding where possible but do need the money raised from events to help finance these improvements.

Our village fair is taking place on Sunday July 17th, like last year, it will be free to enter for all residents, the cost of putting on an event like this is huge, without other organisers bringing events, both public and private to Naseby we would have to charge an entry fee to our own fair.

We are also bringing live professional theatre to Naseby this year; the cost of these touring groups is underwritten by the management team of the hall using funds from events on the recreation ground.

The village hall and recreation ground is registered with the charity commission. The trustees run the charity on behalf of the village, the current trustees believe that restricting access to the recreation ground for just a few days a year for the income it provides is reasonable and proportional. There are other places available for dog walking and personal exercise within the village that are safe and accessible, indeed until about 20 years ago the recreation ground was off limits to dogs, as Welford recreation ground still is.

The trustees meet every month, on the fourth Wednesday at 7.30pm in the upstairs room at the village hall, if you wish to question the trustees about their policies or have any other comments, I welcome you to attend and have your say.

You can of course influence these policies by becoming a trustee yourself and assist in the running and management of the hall and recreation ground, we always welcome new people to our team.

REPORTING HIGHWAY FAULTS

It is now simple to report highway faults yourself online using FixMyStreet (https://FixMyStreet.com). Examples would be potholes, damaged street signs, missing or damaged kerbs etc.

The on-screen instructions are reasonably easy to follow. Insertion of a post code brings up a map of the location and a list of reports by other people indicated by yellow circles on the map. The area of map can be moved around and enlarged to identify the precise spot of interest where you can place a new fault marker.

For example, to report a pothole click 'Roads' on the list of faults and a subcategory appears on which 'potholes / highway condition' should be clicked. A photo can be added which shows the pothole (close up and wide view if possible).

On the next screen a brief description should be inserted. You do not need to use a password but should provide an email address. Do NOT click the small box If you do not wish your name to be publicly attached to your report.

When you have submitted the report to FixMyStreet you will receive an email with a copy of what you have input. If you are happy you are requested to confirm that you wish it to be submitted to Northamptonshire Highways.

You will then receive emails direct from Northamptonshire Highways logging the report and in due course indicating what action they intend.

Please note that in Naseby, streetlighting is the responsibility of the Parish Council and faults should be reported to the Clerk or any Parish Councillor.



HOPPER BUS

In addition to the 59/60 buses which provide for shopping trips to Market Harborough on Tuesday and Friday and to Northampton on Monday, Wednesday and Thursday, a Hopper Bus service has started operating from Naseby and other villages on a pilot basis.

A leaflet explaining the service was recently delivered to every household by the local Liberal Democrat Focus Team. The bus operates on Tuesdays and serves Cottesbrooke, Haselbech, Naseby, Cold Ashby, Thornby, Creaton and Brixworth and travels to Aldi at Moulton with an hour for shopping and stops for around an hour at Brixworth to allow access to shops, the cafe and library.

A 14-seater mini bus is being used and stops are only made if there is demand. Bus passes are accepted.

If you are interested in using the scheme, please initially contact one of the Focus Team. On your first journey the driver will provide further details of how to book again.

Initial use has been encouraging to the extent that already a further route to Rushden Lakes shopping centre near Wellingborough is being explored.

FUNDRAISING!

66 Year old from Naseby, prepares to walk over 2000 kilometers for Prostate Cancer UK

Kemal Chetitah, a 66-year-old man from Naseby is walking 2040 kilometers from Canterbury to Rome to raise money for leading men's health charity, Prostate Cancer UK. Kemal has form for taking on walking challenges and you may have seen him training on the roads around Northamptonshire in preparation for this challenge.

Kemal is hoping to raise over £8000 by completing the walk, leaving Canterbury on 16th May, passing through five countries and three major mountain ranges all within 80 days. Starting at Canterbury Cathedral, he will walk the North Downs Way to Dover, before setting sail for France. Once there he will cross the undulating plains of Northern France with their war cemeteries & poppy fields, through to the mountains of Jura and into Switzerland, crossing the Alps at the Great St Bernard Pass. After the Alps, his route winds its way through the wetlands of the River Po and its tributaries, then crosses the Apennines, the main mountain range of Italy to the Mediterranean coast and the Tuscan countryside, finishing in Lazio at the Vatican and St. Peters in Rome. Kemal punishing schedule should mean he arrives in Rome by the 4thAugust this year, with all profits going to join the fight to help save men's lives.

Kemal was inspired to take on the challenge for Prostate Cancer UK in honor of his father & brother who have both suffered from the disease. Currently one man dies every 45 minutes from prostate cancer in the UK. That's more than 11,500 men a year and by 2030, prostate cancer is set to become the most commonly diagnosed cancer of all in the UK




