## WEST NORTHANTS COUNCIL ELECTORAL BOUNDARY REVIEW

Following consultation on its initial proposals, the Local Government Boundary Commission for England has issued its final recommendations for West Northamptonshire.

The recommendations include reducing the number of councillors from the current 93 (31 wards each with 3 councillors) down to 76 within 35 new or adjusted wards. There will be 13 wards with 3 councillors, 15 wards with 2 councillors and 7 with a single councillor.


A new 'Naseby' electoral ward is being created stretching from Welford and Sibbertoft along the A5199 road to include Spratton. This ward is one of the single councillor wards with the number of electors assessed as 4,655 in 2022, rising to 4,699 in 2028.

The remaining parts of the current 3 councillor Brixworth electoral ward will be split into two single councillor wards. A 'Brixworth' village ward and a 'Rural North East' ward stretching from Marston Trussell and East Farndon, along the A508 road corridor to Holcott and Hannington.

Haselbech and Kelmarsh will be part of the new 'Rural North East' ward.

West Northamptonshire Council have accepted the recommendations of the Boundary Commission and the proposals will now go before Parliament around October 2023, before being used for the next elections for West Northamptonshire Council in 2025.



## FIX MY STREET REPORTING HIGHWAYS FAULTS

If you drive or walk or cycle you will come across potholes, particularly at this time of the year.

It is simple to report highway faults on line using FixMyStreet (<a href="https://FixMyStreet.com">https://FixMyStreet.com</a>). Examples would be potholes, damaged street signs, missing or damaged kerbs etc.

The on-screen instructions are easy to follow. Insertion of a post code or road name (High Street Naseby) brings up a map and a list of reports already made by other people, indicated by yellow circles on the map. The map can be moved around and enlarged to identify the precise spot of interest where you can place a 'green pin' fault marker.

To report a pothole click 'Roads' on the list of faults and a subcategory appears on which 'potholes / highway condition' should be clicked. Ideally a photo should be added which shows the pothole (close up and wide view if possible).

On the next screen a brief description should be inserted. You do NOT need to use a password but should provide an email address. Only click the small box If you don't mind your name being publicly attached to your report.

When you have submitted the report, you will receive an email with a copy of what you have input. If you are happy with the details, you are requested to confirm that you wish it to be submitted to West Northamptonshire Council Highways.

You will then receive emails direct from West Northamptonshire Highways logging the report and in due course indicating what action, if any, they intend.

Please note, that in Naseby Street lighting is the responsibility of the Parish Council and faults should be reported to the Clerk or any parish Councillor.

#### **NASEBY BOOK EXCHANGE**

The Book Exchange was one year old on July 1<sup>st</sup> and has had a very good year.



We have continued our policy of being open all the time with no problems. The big improvement has been the addition of a seat to go outside for resting, relaxing, and reading when the weather allows. This was funded, as the Book Exchange was, by the Kelmarsh Windfarm Community Benefit and was installed in May.

## NASEBY CHURCH OF ENGLAND PRIMARY ACADEMY



#### An exciting new beginning

As we end one academic year and prepare to begin another, we reflect on some of the wonderful events our school has enjoyed through 22/23. We enjoyed our first year as part of Pathfinder Trust, alongside 10 other local schools. Being a part of the Pathfinder Trust has benefitted the school in many ways; staff have been able to access training, support and career progression opportunities, Pathfinder have also provided improvements to our school site such as the long anticipated redesign of our school playground. Next year, we look forward to joining other schools in sports competitions and festivals, as part of the Trust.

#### **Inspiring learners**

In the summer terms, we have enjoyed exploring 2 whole school topics on 'The Battle of Naseby' & 'Celebrating 180 Years of our school'.

We were inspired by a visit from the Battle of Naseby Sealed Knot Association who came to talk to the children about the battle and gave much enjoyment through allowing the children to handle a range of battle artefacts. Our speaker – John, was 'wowed' by one pupil, Verity - who brought along an original sword from the battle! In June, our Years 5 and 6 class were invited to visit the 'Living Village' which was set up to provide a view of what life was like in 1645 during the Battle of Naseby. The children were in awe of the weapons, artefacts, and interactions with the members of the Sealed Knot. We enjoyed being shown how to use weapons such as 'Pikes' and the demonstration of the guns used during the battle. The children would have happily spent all day taking in everything that they had set up for us and we look forward to our next visit. We would like to thank Steve Hanson for kindly organising the visit.

Built in 1843, this year is the 180<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of our school and the children have been learning about the school's history. We are extremely fortunate to have many original artefacts which date back to 1800's. We would like to invite Naseby residents and anyone who has previously attended the school, to join us in celebrating our 180<sup>th</sup> Anniversary on Saturday 30<sup>th</sup> September. I would like to thank the Naseby School Association for helping to set up and run coronation themed activities through the day. The school would also like to thank Chris Bignall and the Village Hall Volunteers who kindly worked with us to help organise, set up and provide refreshments for the event. A great day was had all round and there was a great atmosphere with school & local community coming together to celebrate.

#### **Events**

In May, our year 3 & 4 children entered the Northamptonshire 'Step by Step' dance competition. Trained by Miss Holly from the Northamptonshire School of Dance, the children performed an American Smooth Jazz and Viennese Waltz Sequences in front of a packed audience at the Royal & Derngate Theatre. We were proud they came 5<sup>th</sup> out of 14 other schools.

In June, Years 5 and 6 visited Hartington Hall in Derbyshire for a 3 day residential trip. The children enjoyed participating in activities such as bouldering, rock climbing, abseiling, orienteering, and whizzing across a zip wire. As you can imagine, some of these activities looked a little bit scary, but all of the children were incredibly brave and tried their hardest to participate. 

## NASEBY IN 2026 – A TARGET FOR SPECUATIVE HOUSING!!!

Naseby will be at risk of speculative development from 2026 onwards unless a Neighbourhood Development Plan is put in place.

Currently development in Naseby is governed by the Daventry Local Plan which was adopted in 2020 and was intended to cover the period up to 2029. This includes a Naseby Inset Map with a defined settlement boundary drawn tightly around the built up area of the village and within which only limited development is permitted. Residential development applications outside the settlement boundary would normally be refused planning permission.

The Government requires all Planning Authorities to identify a supply of readily developable residential land equivalent to 5 years' worth of housebuilding in the council's area. If the housing land availability figure falls below 5 years, developers are able to submit speculative planning applications with a reasonable chance of being successful. In April 2022 the Daventry Local Plan housing land availability figure was 7.5 years, comfortably above 5 vears.



#### **Future West Northamptonshire Local Plan**

West Northants Council are currently preparing the next local plan which will cover the whole of its area for the period up to 2041. It will replace the three current local plans adopted by Northampton Borough, Daventry District and South Northamptonshire Councils, which cover the period up to 2029. The timetable for the new Local Plan envisages its adoption in March 2026, well before 2029. As soon as it is adopted development proposals within Naseby will be decided in accordance with the new Local Plan and a single 5 year housing land supply figure will apply across the whole W.N. Council area.

A shortfall in the single 5 year supply figure would lead to speculative housing sites and without a neighbourhood development plan Naseby would be a target in this region. Most of our adjoining parishes already have a neighbourhood plan or are well on the way to completing them.

The 2022 housing land supply figures for South Northamptonshire area was 6.9 years and for Northampton Borough area only 3.8 years, well below the critical 5 years. Figures for 2023 are not yet available.

With the historic Northampton Borough problems of maintaining a 5 year supply it is easy to envisage any future shortfall being made up from rural areas within the West Northants area.

The best way to resist future speculative planning applications in Naseby is to have an adopted Neighbourhood Development Plan.

#### **Neighbourhood Development Planning**

Only parish and town councils can initiate a neighbourhood plan, but a working group of residents is absolutely essential. The process allows parishes to determine how much development and what type is needed, where it should be sited and which areas should be protected for environmental, historical or landscape reasons.

The Parish Council has already resolved to commence a Neighbourhood Plan and intend to appoint an experienced planning consultant to assist the process. Government grants are available which should meet most of the costs involved.

Neighbourhood plans were first introduced within the Localism Act of 2011. Prior to that, Naseby produced a 'Village Design Guide' which was adopted in 2008 and will be a pretty good starting point for a neighbourhood plan.

#### **Public Meeting**

A public meeting is being held at the Methodist Chapel on Tuesday 19th September at 7.00 pm, at which a presentation on a Naseby Neighbourhood Development Plan will be made with a question and answer session. Please come along and take part if you are concerned about the possibility of uncontrolled development within Naseby.

## SPEED DISPLAY SIGN VOLUNTEER REQUIRED

For years there have been complaints and concerns over vehicles speeding through the village. The Parish Council's Speed Display Sign tries to tackle this by being regularly moved between different locations as a visual deterrent.

Geoff Capel has been looking after the sign for 4 years but has now stepped down and we are looking for one or two volunteers who are concerned about speeding to take over the duties.

Ideally the sign should be moved every 2 to 3 weeks between 6 fixed points. It is powered by a small battery which requires regular recharging and swapping over with a spare battery plus some minor maintenance duties.

We have been trying to find new volunteers for well over a year without success. If no one comes forward it is likely that the speed display unit will have to be retired.



#### Naseby Village Hall and Recreation Ground

Residents were invited to a meeting at Naseby Village Hall on June 28th to discuss concerns raised by the Harley Davidson rally on June 8/9/10th.

Following a lively discussion the following policies will be adopted by the village hall management team.

Event organisers who wish to 'close the field' will have to pay an additional charge. This will be passed on to Naseby Dog Meadow who will then allow residents to use their field for free during the event. A booking system will be set up so residents can book a 30 minute slot.





Music and bar licence will be restricted to 10.00pm on 'school nights' and 12.00 midnight on other evenings.

Dog events that are booked in overnight or for more than 1 day will have to set up their arenas and camp site on the far side of the field.





We are always looking for donations of cakes and a hand setting up, serving, and packing away, so please call Jasmin on 07525 842831 if you can donate either a cake or a hand.



Home-Start is a registered charity working in our local communities providing local support to families with young children who are vulnerable and isolated. We support children and families across Daventry and South Northants areas. We work in many villages, smaller and larger, as well as the three market towns. The isolation and vulnerabilities can be very significant in more dispersed rural communities. and there are often fewer opportunities through other organisations and support to help the families and children.

All families supported by **Home-Start** are experiencing difficult or stressful situations and have at least one child aged 5 years or under. The range of needs can vary significantly and often alongside the initial presenting issues at the time of referral there are other issues and difficulties for families and children that haven't been shared or identified. The children and families we work with often face multiple disadvantages, for example: behavioural problems; emotional problems; learning difficulties; physical disability; postnatal depression; and bereavement. Our services continued during the pandemic. We increasingly see financial uncertainly, debt and demand for foodbanks. We can support families to ensure their children are ready to start school – something especially important in the next few years, with limited or no socialising during lockdown.

Support from **Home-Start** results in improved wellbeing, children doing better in school, improved mental health for parents, parents feeling supported — and feeling like they are better parents. We partner with public sector and other charitable organisations who support families. As well as our core home-visiting service, we run group programmes and provide tailored intensive support when needed. We are very locally based so our volunteers often enable families to access other local services and support such as debt advice, foodbanks, and health advice. This can be through practical support to make or attend the first appointment or giving parents the confidence to secure other help themselves.

We work with families to build on their strengths and give them the support they tell us they need. Volunteers offer no judgement, they are compassionate and experienced, offering confidential support and help.

With **Home-Start** support, both parents and their children grow in self-esteem and confidence. As a result, they are more likely to access training and employment opportunities that help them to achieve economic well-being and to boost the local economy. **Telephone number:** 01327 353139
